**SHERIFF
COLLECTS
TAXES**

**Information About Rebate
and Penalty System**

Sheriff Culver's office has been a busy scene since last Thursday noon when the tax roll, which had been made up by County Clerk Roland, was turned over to him for collection. The amount of the taxes of all the property in the whole county is given in this roll and the office has been fairly deluged with mail from non-residents, inquiring the amount of the tax on their property. Since the roll was opened the office has issued 212 receipts and has taken in between \$9000 and \$10,000. Three deputies have been employed to handle the work and the force will be increased later.

Under the present law there is a system of rebate and penalties which aid the sheriff in the speedy collection of taxes. If a person pays all of his taxes between the date of the opening of the books and March 15, 1905, he is entitled to three per cent. rebate on the amount of his tax. If he only pays half of his taxes before the first Monday in April, he has until the first Monday in October to pay the balance without being penalized, but if no part of the taxes are paid before the first Monday in April there is a penalty of 10 per cent. imposed and the taxes draw interest at the rate of 12 per cent. until paid.

Hon. W. I. Vawter has recently introduced a bill, which, if it become a law, will enable the soldiers who are at the soldiers' home at Roseburg to live the remainder of their days with their wives, which they cannot do under the present arrangement. It provides for the erection of a number of small but neat cottages on the grounds of that institution, where the old soldier and his companion of many years can live in cozy comfort during his residence there, and will surely meet with general approval.

The senate has already passed a bill to appropriate \$45,000 to settle the balance of the claims of the veterans of the Oregon Indian wars of 1855-6, and there is little likelihood of the house failing to concur in the measure. The last legislature appropriated \$100,000 for the relief of these veterans, but legal claims in excess of this amount were filed, and it is to meet this deficiency that the additional appropriation is asked for.
