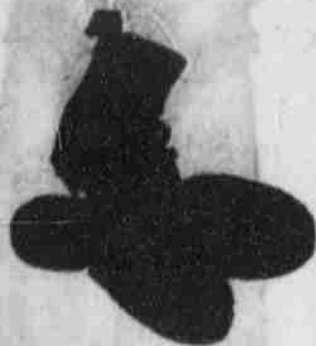

ORDERING IMPLEMENTS OF WAR

Birmingham, Feb. 7.—The Post learns that Turkey has ordered 20 batteries of new field artillery and 50 guns will be placed in position for the defense of the Dardanelles. It is believed the purpose of the order is to strengthen the Dardanelles against all possible attempt of Russian war ships to pass the straits.

ICE BOUND NEW ENGLAND

Boston, Feb. 7.—Nearly all the smaller ports of the New England coast are tightly closed. The larger ports, like Boston, Portsmouth, New Haven and Portland, are filled with huge, floating cakes of ice, which seriously impede navigation.

Practically all of the Maine ports are ice-bound, and shipping is at a standstill. The Cornfield lightship, which broke its moorings, was towed back and put on its station today.

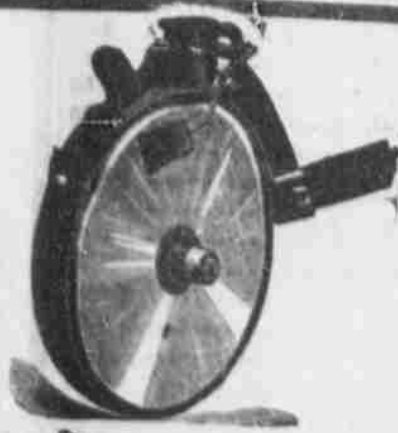

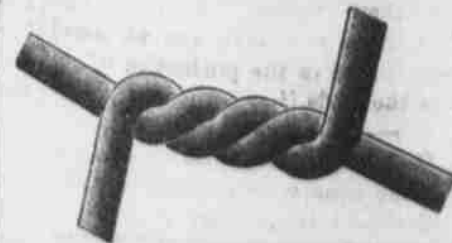
