About Telephones.

Ed. Journal: The telephone company has agents abroad securing signatures for contracts whereby all subscribers agree to pay \$1.50 per month for use of the new 'phone. In the contract offered it is stated that the new contract is a four-party line and that all who are using the ten-party line (\$1.00) will be LIMITED to TEN calls a day, which includes both incoming and outgoing calls. By what right a subscriber may be limited in his use of the telephone is not plain from the standpoint of the man who is paying for the service, although it might appear the effect of this attempted ruling of the company will tend to force patrons to pay the \$1.50 rate and get what calls they desire to make, rather than pay the usual \$1.00 rate and get a limited number. Why the company places the limit at ten is not exactly understood by patrons who may want to make twenty some time. If a man had made his ten calls and his house got on fire, or he needed medical aid, he would be in a bad fix. Then, again, he might see some vandals pulling down the telephone poles and cutting them into stovewood, or stealing the 'phones, and owing to his tenth and last call being in, he couldn't notify the dear company—unless he walked down to tell it, which he would be very apt to do considering the generosity of the company in his behalf. The laws governing common carriers must be introduced here to say whether the telephone company has any right to tell to a man how many times he shall use a 'phone when he pays for regular service. There is another question which arises from a consideration of our past service. Aside from a few institutions burning down because it was impossible to get central, and a few criminals making their escape from similar reasons, general experience is that when you can't get central short of from 15 to 20 rings. Therefore, if a poor patron wants a ten-call-a-day-'phone he will use up his allowance before he gets central. It might be a good thing to have included in that contract a proviso whereby a fellow could have the right to ring for a day or two to get central before the company commences to register his calls off. Two telephone companies is a bad thing for one town, but when one company proposes to step outside the rights given to a common public servant and en-
