A Democratic Senator.

(Roseburg Review, Dem.) Senator and Mrs. O. P. Coshov arrived Tuesday evening from Salem. Enroute home they visited with relatives in Eugene and Rowanville. During the legislative session Senator Coshov rendered good service to Douglas county. It was largely through his efforts as a member of the ways and means committee that the state normal school at Drain was not cut off entirely, but instead the appropriation for the ensuing two years was increased to \$21,000, the allowance heretofore being but \$12,000. Over \$9,000 additional was also granted for maintenance and improvements at the soldiers' home, besides the \$2,900 provided by Representative Yawter's bill for the erection of cottages there. Senator Coshov was also an earnest advocate of the bill passed providing flat salaries for state officers. He introduced but few bills, and among those passed

are: Providing for curing defects of registration in transfer of land titles under the Torrens law; allowing courts to appoint temporary district attorneys when the regular incumbent of the office is interested in any way in the defendant; authorizing guardians to sell real property of minors at private sale; besides the Roseburg and Myrtle Creek charter bills. His bills for abolishing the closed season for fishing for salmon trout with a hook and line, and one against shooting on the public highways, were passed by the senate but met defeat in the house, through lack of proper explanation when they came up for passage.

Salem Kindergarten.

The Salem public kindergarten has just completed the fifth month of very successful work. During the spring term a number of little folks will enter, and the directors have made the tuition a special rate of \$8 for the remaining three months. Patrons who desire to take advantage of this reduction should start the little ones this week, the new term beginning last Monday, February 27th. Any one wishing to know about the work of the kindergarten should see Miss Palmer, the director, or call upon the children at work in the Sunday school room of the Presbyterian church.

Four Committed.

Four insane patients were committed to the asylum yesterday by the officials from the several counties of which they were residents. Mrs. Jennie Oster was brought from Multnomah county; Mrs. Annie Rasmussen, from Yamhill county; Arthur Hans, from Lane, and August Rhinestone, from Multnomah.

Lane county Democrats are objecting because Governor Chamberlain appointed a prominent Republican politician circuit judge. They forget that Chamberlain was elected by Republicans assisted by a few Democrats.

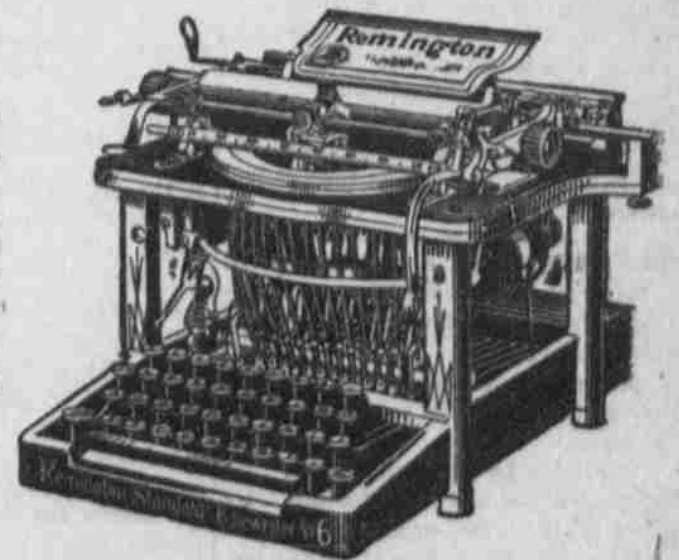
