Through the enterprise of the Salem members of the state board of horticulture, Chas. A. Park, and several other people, residents of Salem are now enabled to have their fruit trees properly sprayed and cared for. Mr. Armstrong was induced to purchase one of the Wiggins' gasoline power spraying outfits, tank pump, engine, wagon and all the necessary appliances. With this, Mr. Armstrong is doing most excellent work. He is spraying the trees and shrubbery with a composition or mixture prepared under the direction of scientific horticulturists, and when this is put on the trees, the results are most excellent. It removes all fungi, scale, aphids and other vermin that is detrimental to fruit trees. The cost of doing this work is reduced to a minimum, and every one owning a few fruit trees cannot afford to be without this purifier and protection. When the work is being done, it is well to have all rose bushes and other shrubs that are subject to be infested, thoroughly sprayed and cleaned for the season.
