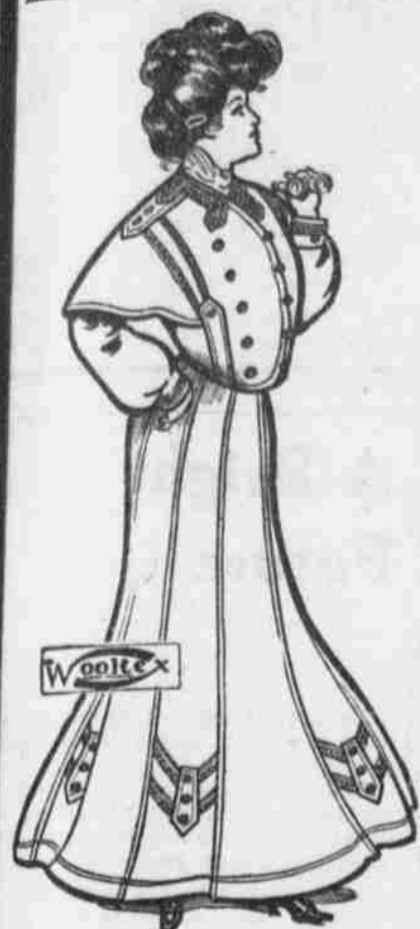

NEW BANK OPENS

Dallas, Polk County, With a Strong Officiary

Dallas, March 6.—The Dallas National bank opened its doors for business this morning, at 9 o'clock. The opening of the bank has been delayed several weeks on account of the failure of needed office furniture to arrive from Chicago, but the officers have decided to wait no longer and will use temporary furniture until the belated shipments arrive.

The new bank commences business with a capital stock of \$25,000. The stockholders comprise some of the leading capitalists of Dallas, Portland and Salem. The promoters of the new enterprise are all practical business men, and it is doubtful if another banking institution in the Willamette valley has more capable managers. The officers of the Dallas National bank are R. E. Williams, president; Claud Gatch, vice president; Eugene Hayter, cashier. The directors are Dr. B. H. McCallon, Walter Williams, Claud Gatch, R. E. Williams and I. N. Woods. Mr. Williams continued in the active management of the Dallas City bank up to the time of resigning his position to become president of the new bank. He is succeeded in the old bank by W. G. Vassall, the former efficient assistant cashier.

Claud Gatch, the vice president of the Dallas National bank, is cashier

of Ladd & Bush's bank in Salem, and is well known in financial circles throughout the Northwest. Eugene Hayter, a former clerk of Polk county, and until recently a bookkeeper in the Dallas City bank, is the cashier of the new bank. Mr. Hayter is an experienced office man, and has a wide acquaintance in Polk county.

BUGGY HOUSE BUILT

E. S. Lampport Completes His Large New Building

The E. S. Lampport harness and saddlery establishment is just about to occupy its new building, or enlarged quarters. During the past few months they have built on the rear of their old store building at 289 Commercial street a full two story projection which now gives them a building 22 feet wide by 165 feet long. The full two stories of this enlarged place will be used for their present harness and saddlery business and a full line of buggies, carriages and wagons.

Ed Lampport has been in business in Salem ever since 1869, and he has not only been in his line of business longer than any man in Salem, but more years continuously than any man in Oregon. There have been scores of competitors in that time, who have failed, quit or sold out to Mr. Lampport. During all this time he has slowly but surely moved to the front by methods that could not help but win. The new addition to his store room has been built chiefly for the purpose of accommodating a large line of vehicles, and his son, Ed Lampport, Jr., will have immediate charge of that department.
