Beautify Salem.

Ed. Journal: Portland has a civic improvement board, why is it not a good plan for Salem to have something on that order, too? Is this city so far ahead of the lower Willamette city that she does not need cleaning, or beautifying, or can it be possible, but surely it cannot, that the residents of the Capital City are not energetic enough to see that it is for their own gain, a thing of this kind is carried on?

Seventy-five of the progressive and public-spirited women of Portland, have already held a meeting and organized themselves into Women's Auxiliary to the Portland Civic Improvement Board and have sworn to do all in their power to aid in this work, the crying need of which is everywhere so apparent.

It is a hard thing to say but nevertheless it is a fact that the so-called public spirited men of this city, have allowed the women of Portland to show them up as pettifoggers and mossbacks who do not know what is for their own good and who apparently do not care whether their home city ever becomes more than an overgrown village or not.

If the plan, as outlined in the Journal several days ago, was adopted it would become so greatly changed in a few weeks that an old resident happening to be away during that time, would return to a place which he would not recognize as the city of old fences, bill-boards, dirty streets and unkempt lawns, which he had departed from, such a short time before.

The women are not barred from this move and have just as great a chance to show their loyalty to their home city as did the Portland women. Really the women should evince, if possible, a greater interest than the men, for it is conceded that the women are the commandants of the home and they should be fully aware of the needs of the home to change it from possibly a shabby looking place to a thing of beauty.
