**ATHLETES CHOOSE SALEM**

**"Big Four" Track Meet Will Be Held at Fair Grounds Annually**

At the meeting of the representatives of the four schools interested, at the Imperial Hotel, in Portland, Saturday, it was decided to make the "Big Four" association permanent, and to hold the meets of the same at the state fair grounds, near this city, annually, in the early part of June.

Manager Simpson, of W. U.; Captain Hug, of U. of O.; Prof. Johnson, of O. A. C., and Manager Wirtz, P. U., were those present at the meeting, and Captain Hug was elected temporary chairman. A constitution was gotten up, which will be submitted to the deferent schools this week, and a meeting of the board of control, consisting of the managers of the track teams, will be held at Albany, as a neutral point, on the first of May, to make the necessary arrangements for the meet. This board of control will have the sole management of the association, and the presidents of the four schools are made an arbitration board, to settle all questions and difficulties which may arise.

A championship cup will be the grand prize, to be competed for, and the school winning three meets will be entitled to its possession. The school winning the June meet this year will take possession until defeated by some other school, unless they succeed in holding it for three years, when it will be theirs. Individual prizes will also be given each year, gold medals for first in all events, silver medals for second and bronze for third.

**COLLECT MONEY AT NIGHT.**

**Sheriff's Office Is Such a Busy Place That It Is Kept Open Noons and Evenings.**

This is the last week of the rebate on the tax roll, the time being up next Wednesday, March 15th, which is the last day, and the money is coming into the sheriff's office in such sums that it now takes Sheriff Culver and three deputies in the day time and two deputies at night to handle the work. One hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars has already been collected, and the sheriff says that the amount will reach a point considerably over \$200,000 by Wednesday night. This will be over two thirds of the total sum on the roll, and will be one of the best collections ever made in this county. The office is now being kept open during the noon hour, and, until Wednesday, will be open part of the night.

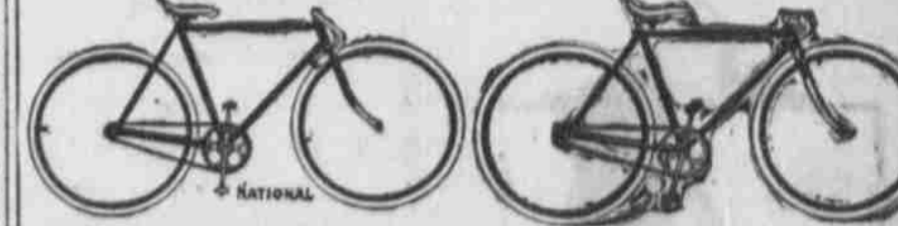
