A Normal School Suggestion.

Editor Journal: In every state of the Union we find normal schools established and maintained as a part of the common school system. In the early years of these schools, when they were new and untried, there was in several states sharp contention over their establishment and continuance. The people learned that it was economy to have training for the work of school teaching.

Oregon seems to be just awakening to what passed 50 years ago. Ignorant rage always works rank injustice. History sometimes repeats itself.

If the people think they have too many normal schools why not seek to consider the matter sensibly. There seems to be a desire to tear down merely to destroy. The state certainly needs

work of this kind. To retain one or two of the present would partake of injustice if all are discontinued and proper steps taken to establish the normal school system all ought to be satisfied. It would be easy to do this by establishing one normal school in connection with the state university.

There is already at that institution a department of psychology and pedagogy and the work of this line done there would be helped by having more pupils and better opportunities. In fact a normal school in connection with the university is the thing. It would help the university and accomplish the normal school work without unnecessary expense in the way of duplicating libraries, laboratories and facilities.

Maintain all, or do away with all and provide for one in connection with the university.

OREGON APPLES IN SCOTLAND

Oregon apples are in high favor in Scotland. A price equal to \$15 a barrel was recently realized on a lot sold in the Edinburgh market. This high price was due not only to the remarkable quality of the fruit, but also to the excellent manner in which it was packed. The Edinburgh Scotsman, of February 11, in reviewing the apple situation there, says:

At the present time the finest apples from any outside source come from Oregon. Some of the best are put up in bushel boxes containing 120 fruits each. They have sold at various prices, depending upon the quality of the samples. These range from 14s to 15s for fine specimens. But the largest and finest have realized from 15s to 20s. A sovereign a bushel for foreign apples in February is remarkable, to say the least. They are Newtons, immense in size, clear-skinned, of high flavor, and above all, well graded and attractively packed. Eastern states Newton Pippins packed in barrels, the best that could be sent from these centers have sold for as much as 41s a barrel—the highest price secured this season for Newtons in barrels. But what is that sum to 20s a bushel, equal to 60s a barrel? This wonderful difference is not altogether due to variations in quality. The small, clean, bushel box package plays an important part in respect to price. When we first advocated the use of the non-chargeable bushel-box by home apple packers, the question of cost was at once raised as an objection against its use. But that is no account when the extra prices secured by its use and the decreased cost of transit are considered. The foreign growers now send us over 1,000,000 bushel boxes of apples each year. Their use is found remunerative by them. The prices that have been made for apples already this year are without parallel in the history of the trade. But yet the foreign fruitgrower does not dominate the situation in this respect exclusively. British apples have also been sold this year at 10s a half, equal to 20s a bushel, and if the fruit had been collected and specially graded and packed like the Oregon fruit, it would have made higher prices still. Months ago we gave first and exclusive news of the actual collection and purchase of these Oregon fruits in the Scotsman. We said that they had been bought for 10s a bushel in the orchards of Oregon. Well, as 10,000 bushels were secured, it is clear that large profits had been made on the deal. At that time we announced the purchase tons of home grown apples were a drug at 1s 6d and 2s a bushel. These facts prove that the demand for best apples in the British markets is practically insatiable at high values, even in seasons of abundance. With so much fruit land available in the four kingdoms, it is a pity that apple planters are not more busy. As the result of these high prices a great impetus will be given to home produce industries. The fruit growing movement has done much good to country cultivators, and the prospects for extended production are certainly better than ever. Cold storage for home grown apples will prove of undoubted value to all connected with the business. As far as the grower is concerned, it will enable him to prolong the season at a time when the best prices are realized. With a vastly increased output by home-growers, the use of nonchargeable, standardized boxes and cold storage, the spring apple season can be made most lucrative and important. Cold storage has enabled the foreign apple-grower to strengthen his position in the British fruit markets.
