John R. Coe died at his home in Woodburn at midday on March 9, 1905. Deceased was born in Morrow county, Ohio, December 27, 1828. He became converted and joined the M. E. church at the age of 14 years. In March of 1852 he came over the plains with a large party to Hangtown, Cal., there they arrived on August 16, and was one of the few in the party who saw only the pleasant side of the trip. He remained there for five years mining, but on account of failing health he removed to Nappa Valley, Cal., where he farmed until 1871, when he was married to Miss Sarah Friend in Iowa. They returned to Nappa Valley and made that their home for 30 years. In 1901 he came to Linn county, Oregon, where he lived until one year ago this March, since which time he has been a resident of Woodburn. Mr. Coe has always been an active church worker, having been a class leader for 30 years. He was a man of unusually bright intellect; had a wonderful memory; was a successful business man; amassed quite a fortune; was a natural philanthropist and gave liberally to charitable and educational institutions. He was a lover of poetry, Burns and Shakespeare being his favorite authors, and he could repeat page after page of the latter's works. Mr. Coe was one whom any one would be proud to have called friend. He leaves a wife and son, Lee Coe, of this city, and an adopted daughter, Mrs. Mattie Elliot of Goshen, Ore. Funeral services will be held in the M. E. church Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, Rev. D. H. Leech officiating. The remains will be accompanied by Mrs. Coe to Nappa Valley, Cal., for interment.

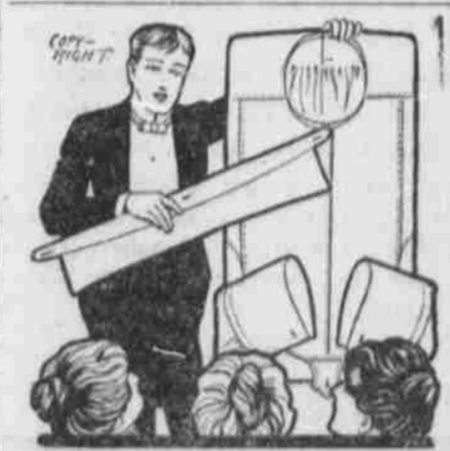
