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## TAKE HOLD OF THE FLAX INDUSTRY.

The Journal believes the capitalists of this city are making a great mistake when they do not take hold of the flax industry.

The proposition is to establish five scutching mills in the Willamette valley, and a flax mill to work up the product at Salem.

The scutching mills are to cost about \$17,000 each, and the big factory to work up twine and coarse fabrics would cost about \$100,000.

The market is right here at home for all the twine that could be made, and the coarser baling cloths and other products could be sold here.

Mr. Atherton and Mr. Bosse would take \$25,000 of the stock, Mr. Wilcox as much more, and other gentlemen would take some stock.

No greater advertisement of this section could come about than the establishment of one such industry. Persons who are well-informed know that there is at least a million of idle capital in the Salem banks.

The right kind of a spirit taking hold of this matter would insure its success inside of thirty days, and convert the ruins of the North Mill creek water power into a busy hive of industry.

The sacrifices and endurance of a man of a man like Mr. Bosse should count for something with our capitalists, as such a man is not met by a kind Providence to a community every day.

## THERE SHOULD BE PROSECUTIONS.

While the legislature was in session S. A. D. Puter came up to Salem and tried to grab 2800 acres of state school land, in open and flagrant defiance of law.

He was detected red-handed in the act, and the newspapers were filled with tales of **THE GIGANTIC FRAUD**. His stolen pigeons made confessions of **THE ATTEMPTED CRIME**.

About two thousand dollars of money was held up that had been used in carrying on the fraud, and there was abundant evidence of the deliberate nature of the fraud.
