

PRESENT YEAR WILL BREAK BUILDING RECORD

Large Number of Houses are Under Way and More Will Start Soon

Last Saturday the Journal published a list of the new buildings being constructed in the city, but owing to the disagreeable weather the writer was unable to get a complete list. Many of the people who are contemplating building have postponed the work in hopes of having more favorable weather.
