A gas well has been tapped in Crook county.

Astoria has a municipal debt of \$27,921.

Sumpter is to have an up-to-date afternoon daily.

The total vote cast at the city election in Eugene Monday was 1223.

All the placer mines in the Grants Pass district are working full time this spring.

The Oregon state camp of Modern Woodmen will meet at Baker City May 3d.

The town of Adams, near Pendleton, is having a diphtheria scare, a number of persons being down with the disease.

After breaking into a house at Hood River, and carrying off all they could, the thieves set fire to the building.

R. M. Veach was re-elected mayor of Cottage Grove by a handsome majority over the other two candidates in the race.

SCENERY INSPIRES EDITOR

Writes of the Retreating Bluffs Along the Mississippi River

Missouri Valley, March 31.—We made up all time, pulled across Dakota and Minnesota against a hard wind, and entered St. Paul on time to the minute.

The pastures were showing the first tinges of green as we started south from St. Paul Friday morning, March 31st. The ride down the Mississippi valley on the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul is a panoramic dream of beauty.

We touch the river here and there. The bluffs grow abrupt, and either advance or retreat, elad in forests not as large as our Oregon forests, but beautiful at all seasons. The silver birches predominate, the graceful trees that one of the poets has called the Lady of the Woods. Lake Pepin is as charming as any of our Pacific coast harbors, and, looking south, much resembles Yaquina bay, the hills enclosing at its lower end, and the train speeding along its west bank, makes it a scene of grandeur.

Before leaving the transcontinental train and its impressions, I wish to remark that you do not live as well as you go farther East. You do not get as big a meal in St. Paul or Minneapolis for 50 cents as is served in Salem, Portland or Seattle. The butter is inferior as soon as you are west of the Cascades, and only grows good again in Chicago.

Watson's restaurant at Portland is unequalled in quality and service by anything in the whole country. I doubt if it is surpassed in San Francisco in the comfort and variety of well-cooked food offered. Give me the West for a square meal for your money every time.

The dining car service on the Northern Pacific is very good—a la carte for breakfast and lunch, and the dinner of five courses is \$1.00. Many people carry lunches, and eat either the \$1.00 dinner, or the other meals at 25 cents and upward, according to choice.

We had Toke Point oysters on the shell; soup and fish, salmon, halibut and lake trout; roast meats and fowls; the finest vegetables; then pastry and pudding, ice cream, fruits, nuts, cheese, coffee. Out of these you can pick a dollar dinner in five installments. You can't order it all brought on at once, as some of us sidewalk farmers do at home, but you can take an hour or an hour and a half to discuss your meal, and they have the pleasantest waiters of any road we ever boarded on.

The menu cards are works of art, with advertisements of the Portland exposition that would delight Tom Richardson in his efforts to boom the Northwest. From force of habit, no doubt, a great many of the railroad officials east of Portland are still boasting of Puget Sound and California. We met a Milwaukee, Wis. physician, Dr. F. J. Phipps, who saw only the Sound country, and came back from the Pacific coast disgusted. He could not see any permanent agricultural resources back of Western Washington, and was very sorry he did not see Oregon. Dr. Phipps is an example of hundreds who are taken to the coast, steered up among the stumps and forests of the Sound, get the idea that there is no general farming, dairying or fruit growing, and return to the East with a distorted idea of the Northwest coast. We told the doctor of some of the resources of Oregon, of the character of cities like Portland and the Willamette valley towns, gave him some advertising matter to distribute, and he will be back to see the exposition, and the Western Oregon country.

We met two bright business women from Sea Cliff, Long Island. They conducted a dry goods store at New Castle, Penn., for five years, sold it out for enough to clean up \$20,000 in five years. They had been on a five months' trip to the coast, which had cost them \$800, and were now bound for home. They were sorry they had spent so much time in California, had been sold some Pasadena real estate, were charmed with a few days stay at Portland, and sorry they saw nothing of Western Oregon. They got favorable impressions of the Willamette valley and cities like Salem and Eugene, Albany and Corvallis only by chance—but so favorable they are coming back to investigate, and want to locate and go into business among us, after a trip to Europe.

We met a young New Yorker, Robert Finkelstein, wholesale dealer in smoked fish, 123-125 Havermeier street, Brooklyn. He was on his way back, homeward for the Empire City—no place like New York to him—after a month on the coast buying cold storage salmon. He is a bright young German business man, and his firm does a large trade in smoked fish, salmon, halibut, herring, ducks, geese, chickens and turkeys. The poultry is boiled and then smoked, and has to be consumed in a few days after it is put on the market. He saw nothing of Oregon but Astoria and Portland, and was interested in the fisheries.

A business gives one an idea of the importance of maintaining the salmon industry, and of preserving our best sturgeon and other food fishes. I talked with a stock buyer at Wagon, Minn., and he said he was paying \$2.75 to \$3.00 for good butcher stock; \$3.25 to \$3.75 for live hogs; \$100 to \$150 for a good farm horse. Good roadsters, thoroughly well broke, were worth \$200. Heavy draft horses, \$300. The freight to St. Paul, 75 miles, was 10 cents per 100 pounds.

wounded up by praising Salem as a good shopping town. She was offered the same hats in Salem for \$7.00 that she had to pay \$10.00 in Portland. Soap, perfume and all toilet articles were correspondingly cheaper at Salem, and just as good. She said the Portland dealers charged San Francisco retail prices with what they call express charges added, and she added: "Portland must have the highest express rates in the world. She was a Philadelphian, was charmed with the Pacific coast, wanted to go to Petaluma and run a chicken ranch when she retired. She said Portland women wore stunning street costumes, but for evening dress San Francisco was next to Paris itself.
