Salem Woolen Mill Store**GRAND JURY CHARGES****WRIGHT AND MONTE****With Providing Tracy and Merrill With
Guns and Ammunition**

The grand jury is working on the Wright-Monte cases, the two men accused of liberating Merrill and Tracy from the penitentiary three years ago, and, from an authentic source, it can be stated that indictments will be returned against the men the latter part of this week.

Wright is now serving a term in the Walla Walla penitentiary, but his time will expire April 17th, when he will be rearrested and brought to Salem for trial. Monte is in the Oregon prison, but his term will not be completed for nearly two years. District Attorney McNary will investigate the law, and believes that he can be arrested on this indictment, even though his term in the prison under the former conviction has not expired, as the offense with which he is now charged is greater than the one he is now serving.

District Attorney McNary stated this morning that, while a few witnesses had

been examined in the land fraud cases, yet he intended to complete the county criminal business before going very extensively into the land cases.

There are a large number of witnesses to examine, and it will take some time to get through with the work. There are no new developments in the investigation, and the officers remain very reticent regarding future moves.
