CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH WILL BE DEDICATED

Tomorrow will occur the formal dedication of the new Congregational edifice just completed on the corner of Center and Liberty streets. The building is a handsome structure, one of the finest in the city, and the members of the church have just cause to feel proud that now their hopes have been fully realized in the furnishing and dedication of so beautiful a building. This creation is the work of Pugh & Carr, of this city, and was erected at a cost approximately of \$12,000. The exterior of the building is painted white, which lends a pleasing contrast to the green of the surrounding maples. The main entrance is situated on Liberty street. These open into a large and spacious ante-room, which adjoins the main auditorium. The auditorium itself will seat comfortably 350 persons, while if the two class rooms on the side are opened, as can be easily done, by simply raising the doors, 150 more can be seated. On the left facing the pulpit, and opposite the class rooms, is the Sunday school room, separated by a movable partition. When this partition is raised another 250 people can be accommodated.

The gallery will seat approximately 150, so that altogether 600 people would no more than fill the structure. The whole building is carpeted in a beautiful red, and the benches have soft cushions to further add to the comfort of the audience. Back of the pulpit to the right is the choir room, and on the other side of the pulpit is a door opening into the pastor's study. The door from the study opens into a large and airy room to be used as the kitchen, in the event of socials or other functions of a similar nature. It is equipped with a stove, sink and both hot and cold water attachments. The stained glass windows are of beautiful designs, and some of them were donated by the different church members. The names of the donors are: Helen L. Williams, P. M. Patton, Linna and Eliza Brooks, The Junior Endeavor Society, and one by one of the first four who organized the church. The church was originally founded on July 4, 1852,

and has grown steadily from a small membership of four to a membership of nearly 300 at the present time. The first pastor was Rev. Obed Dickenson, who is now dead. After him there were seven other pastors. Rev. Kautner, the present pastor, is the ninth man to have charge of the church, and his pastorate has lasted longer than any of his predecessors, as he took up the work here on October 7, 1894. Throughout the whole time Rev. Kautner has labored unceasingly, and his work has always been crowned with success.

The dedicatory sermon will be preached tomorrow morning at 10:30 by the Rev. E. L. House, D. D., of Portland. In the afternoon, at 3:30, there will be a "Good Cheer and Greeting" service, at which time addresses will be given by Revs. C. P. Clapp, P. S. Knight, W. H. Selbeck and others. The evening service, at 7:30, is the time when the formal dedication is to occur. The sermon will be preached by Rev. E. C. Oakley, pastor of the Congregational Church, of Eugene. The sermon will be followed by the reception of members. Special music has been prepared for the occasion, and the public is cordially invited.
