CHICAGO HAS ATTRACTIVE SIGHTS FOR EDITOR

Chicago, April 3.—We arrived at our destination, and have been doing the "Nebis in Horto," or the Garden City, as the Latin mosaic inscription reads in the city hall. Of all American public misrepresentations this nick-name of Chicago is probably the greatest. If this were called the smoky city, the ill-smelling city, the city of waste places, it were more appropriate. But it might well be called the Park City, for it certainly has more parks, all connected by boulevards than any other American city. It is stated that one can tour 128 miles on an auto in one park and never go twice over the same road. The Grand boulevard and its paved street connections north and south make one grand driveway of over 60 miles north and south. It is certainly the auto city, for they are in use by the thousands, and the yellow-wheeled Studebaker is seen as often as any. Among many large structures we visited the Studebaker building on Michigan avenue, and we also saw the Stayer carriage

and wagon factory, both represented at Salem. Thus manufacture and commerce tie the Pacific coast and the heart of the continent together.

The great cities of St. Paul and Minneapolis deserve more than a passing notice. They are noted for manufacturing, for their water power, sawmills and elevators, as railroad centers, and as educational cities. That they will one day be one city no one can doubt who will watch their steady growth towards one another.

One of the events of a trip across the continent is a ride on the Denver express of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway. We finished our beautiful ride down the Mississippi river over this line from St. Paul at Savannah, Ill., where our day coach was attached to the Denver fast train. The road is double-tracked across Illinois, and the right-of-way is unimpeded, for 138 miles into Chicago. The schedule time is three hours, or 46 miles an hour. But there are a number of stops, and

we were 7 or 8 minutes late in leaving. We pulled into the union depot exactly on time. The greater part of the run must have been made at 60 miles an hour. A number of fine cities are on this line, like Elgin, the home of the great national watch factory, one of the most brilliantly illuminated cities in the United States. We spent half a day going through the Marshall-Field dry goods store—said to be the finest in the world. We did not see it all by at least one-half, but saw enough to make us wonder where all this world's vanities will stop. In the restaurant on the seventh floor are accommodations to seat 2000 people, and there is a grill room that will accommodate several hundred more. On the day we were there all the patrons were served with a few twigs of pussy willows, and ladies who took ices received an American Beauty rose. Although it was a bright spring day, all of the store was electric lighted, and the milk-white globes were adorned with green leaves. There were immense bouquets of calla lilies in all of the vestibules, and they are said to have been sent from California, a full carload, and cost \$12,000. At last year's Easter opening this firm spent \$15,000 on decorations, and at one hat sale this spring each called in the millinery department received a Beauty rose that cost at least 25 cents apiece. It is said the Easter decorations this year are to cost about \$80,000. While we were taking some tea in the middle of the afternoon, trays were brought around with home-baked cakes and cookies, and each person could take a sample. They were also for sale. The waiters explained that these sweets were actually home-made, and they were even prepared to tell how they were made, and could give one the receipt. Such surprises are planned to "draw trade." Another drawing card is that ladies can have a piece, whatever they want, cut off from any fabric in the house, and if it does not suit can return it and get the money price returned. All clerks are instructed to show wares with as much painstaking pleasure to mere visitors and inquirers as to actual purchasers. The comforts and conveniences are numberless. While lunching or resting, pages in uniforms go about offering telephone connections, or will hunt up a friend in any part of the store—no small chore, where there are acres of floor space, and 5000 clerks, with, at times of crush, crowds of 25,000 to 50,000 people in these stores at the same time. Of course, Marshall Field's is the popular place to go shopping, and they mean that it shall be.

One of the sights of Chicago is to go through the Montgomery Ward catalogue house. It is on the lake front with a 25-story tower, 369 feet high, next to the Washington monument, the highest tower in this country. City people are not allowed to see these sights, and we explained that we were from out of town, and joined the procession, mostly farmers. We were shown through the establishment, where you can order anything by mail from a paper of pins to a traction engine. In the tower we could see only about four blocks in any direction, as the win was from the west, and shut off the view over the lake with black smoke. It is impossible in an short week to do justice to this city. We are going to do the Art Institute, the Rockefeller University, Thomas orchestra, and are to see John Drew, the comedian, and Hamlet as played in Shakespeare's day, besides several dinner parties, all between Sundays.
