Houston, Texas, April 17.—The Texas grand lodge of the Sons of Hermann convened in biennial session here today with a large attendance of delegates and visitors.

The reports of the officers show that the organization in Texas now embraces about 250 lodges with an aggregate membership of 9000. The convention will remain in session until Thursday. Elaborate entertainment has been arranged for the visitors.

STATE NEWS

Albany has four violin makers. Buena Vista Odd Fellows will erect a 30x60 two-story building.

Silverton has two brass bands, and the citizens are proud of both of them. Many of the business and professional men of Dallas find recreation in the evening playing tennis.

There are only 70 Chinese in Pendleton, and no Chinese children, according to report of a federal inspector.

Hood River is to have one of the latest kind of sanitary soda fountains—the kind that fixes the real pure stuff.

Cottage Grove wants a creamery, and the paper there is trying to get the farmers interested in the matter.

Dallas has a civic improvement league, the object of which is to carry out systematic plans for beautifying the town.

Some one at Corvallis turned the lamps so high in F. L. Miller's incubator that over \$25 worth of eggs were choked beyond the hatching point. Three Grants Pass boys, aged 16, 14 and 13 years old, have been caught, and confessed to many petty robberies there. They have been sent to the reform school.

Ellen Downs, a partially blind girl, was so badly burned by her clothing catching fire from a brush fire at her father's home at Mosby creek, that she died several hours later.

The Corvallis council has made a schedule of pay for firemen on duty. The firemen will receive 40 cents an hour for actual service performed, and the chief gets 75 cents per hour as his salary.

The Oregon City Enterprise says there are a number of young girls in that city who conduct themselves in an unseemly manner when on the streets.

Whitlake City is the name of a new town that has been started on Klamath lake. Already about 30 business houses have decided to locate in the new town.

The Hood River banks have nearly \$250,000 on deposit, and claims that the per capita wealth of the valley is far ahead of many cities greatly in excess of population.

Prof. J. R. McKillop, assistant principal of the High school at Ashland, has resigned his position, and has accepted a government appointment to the schools in the Philippine islands.

Siskiyou county officials have provided for an appropriation that will amount to between \$1800 and \$1900 to be expended in exploiting the resources of that county at the Lewis and Clark exposition at Portland.

The dog poisoner is still doing business at Albany. Sheriff White's valuable Scotch collie was the latest good dog to go. The sheriff offers a reward of \$20 for information that will lead to the arrest of the poisoner.

A circular has been issued by the O. R. & N. system to station agents requiring them to refuse to receive sheep for yardage or shipment unless accompanied by the certificate of the federal inspector, if such sheep are destined for shipment outside of the state.

The Golden Drift mine, one of the largest mining enterprises of the Southern Oregon goldfields, is in full operation. One of the largest dams in that section has been built and the mine is being worked. It is supposed to be the richest one in the group.

Jumping board bills will be punishable in Oregon by fine of \$20 to \$100 or imprisonment for 10 to 30 days after May 15. The new law on that subject declares that it shall be presumptive evidence of intent to defraud if any person shall fail to pay his bill on demand, unless he has made known in advance his inability to pay.

Two itinerant showmen were lately arrested at Seio for breaking into the Paul school house. They were brought before a justice and fined \$5, but they only had \$2 between them, and after promising to send the remaining \$3 the judge let them go. In a few days the showmen returned to Seio and purloined up the balance of their fine.

Billy Sunday, who used to be one of the star players in the Chicago league club, and who later turned evangelist, in a recent sermon at Canon City, Colorado, handed out the following: "Being a church member will not save you; hell is so full of church members that their feet are sticking out of the windows."
