HENEY TAKES REST

The Oregonian says: The defendants in the land fraud cases can now rest their nerves, the attorneys their voices and the court his patience for the remainder of the week at least. All of the prominent men on the indictment roll, with the exception of George C. Brownell and George Sorenson, have appeared for arraignment, and these will face the court on Friday morning. Besides, there are a few of the more unimportant defendants who have not as yet put in an appearance, but all of them have been notified and will be in court either this week or on Monday morning. Brownell is indicted for subornation of perjury in having induced two witnesses to swear falsely before the grand jury, as is alleged, while Sorenson is a co-defendant in the Mitchell case.

Mr. Heney will leave on Friday evening for San Francisco, according to the present program, and will remain there for several weeks, or until near the time when the first case is to be set for trial. This is supposing that the decision of Judge Bellinger in regard to the Mitchell plea of abatement will be in favor of the government and against the quashing of the indictments. Should the decision of the court be for the defendants, however, it would complicate matters greatly and what would come next would be a hard thing to predict. If the court were to so decide it might be necessary for the facts alleged in the pleas to be tried out before a jury and in this case even the preliminary steps in the trial could not be taken until after the jury had been drawn, which has not been done at this time.

If the plea in abatement is not allowed then the defendants will be required to plead at the earliest moment and the decks will be cleared for the battle of the trials to come.

The date of trial in any of the cases has not been determined upon and will not be until the time of the completion of the new federal building is assured and it is positively known when the new court room can be occupied. When that time comes the jury panel will be drawn and every thing made ready for the commencement of the trials.

Northern Settler's Convention.

Galveston, Texas, April 21.—A big convention having for its object the attracting of Northern settlers to the South and Southwest was opened in Galveston today. The attendance is remarkably large and includes the governors of a number of states, industrial agents of leading railroads and representatives of commercial and agricultural organizations throughout the south.

The formal opening took place at 10 o'clock this morning, when the convention was called to order and its objects explained by Colonel T. J. Anderson, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific Railroad Company. After permanent organization had been effected addresses of welcome were delivered by Governor Lanham, of Texas, and Governor Blanchard, of Louisiana. At the afternoon session addresses were presented as follows: "Government Experimental Work in the Southwest," Dr. S. A. Knapp; "Opportunities in Texas," Hon. C. A. Culberson; "Opportunities in Louisiana," Hon. Jas. G. Lee; "Undeveloped Resources of the Gulf Coast Country," Prof. H. P. Attwater. The convention will conclude its business tomorrow.

Martineau Centenary.

London, April 21.—Many observances were held today of the centenary of the birth of James Martineau, the celebrated philosopher and divine, and brother of Harriet Martineau, the authoress. The most notable observance of the anniversary was that held in Dr. Martineau's native city of Norwich, where special services held, attended by representatives of the British and Foreign Unitarian Society, and other societies. Commemorative gatherings were also held in London and in Manchester, Oxford, and other centers.

James Martineau was born in Norwich, April 21, 1805. He was for many years a professor in Manchester New College, and removed to London when that institution was transferred here in 1858, becoming one of the pastors in the chapel in Little Portland Street. He became principal of the college in 1868, retiring from the pastorate in 1874. He was one of the founders of the "National Review." He lived to the great age of 95, his death having occurred but five years ago in Golden Square, this city.

San Jacinto Day.
La Grange, Texas, April 21.—San Jacinto Day was celebrated on a magnificent scale today by the Texas Veterans' Association and the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, in joint annual session here. Memorial services were held with patriotic addresses by several speakers of prominence. Following the concluding business of the convention the delegates and other visitors took part in the outdoor celebration in one of the groves of the city.
