Finding Fish By Telephone.

STATE NEWS

Baker City thinks her street railway will get material.

Fifty new residences are being built at Astoria this season.

Baker City also has money enough now to go ahead and build their new hall.

Two brothers recently met in Eugene who had not seen each other for 50 years.

A group of Modern Woodmen of America has been organized at Junction City.

The Right branch of the O. R. & N. will soon be operated with gasoline motor cars.

Roughing's new team hand will give two open-air concerts weekly this spring and summer.

The Eugene and Albany high school baseball clubs will play a game at Albany next Sunday.

Wood fences in the eastern part of the state are averaging one pound heavier than in former years.

The authorities at Shastika are running the pambles and other undesirable characters out of that place.

The assessor at Pendleton is having a hard time getting the widows there to tell their ages.

Junction City Old Fellows have bought a desirable piece of ground and will build a fine building.

An entertainment is to be given at Pendleton by local talent for the benefit of the Commercial Club gymnasium.

Cottage Grove is going to have a water system, owned by the city, if enough money can be raised for the purpose.

Nine masked men shot and killed 43 sheep on Grand McEntee's ranch near Bly one night last week. No clue to the perpetrators.

The little motor formerly used for running the street cars at Albany has been sold to an Alaska company, and will be used in hauling ore.

Numerous complaints are made to the humane officers at Baker City that some horses and horses used to work are being overworked by their owners.

A free gold strike has been struck at the Dixie mine at Quenberry, in Grant county. A five-stamp mill is running on the ore, and big returns are expected.

Earl King, manager of the Eugene high school baseball team, has correctly solved the baseball problem that the Portland Journal has been publishing.

A number of people around Oregon City are experimenting with the nitrogen bacteria fertilizer, and expect large increased returns from the ground treated.

Two boys at Albany have been arrested and fined \$25 each for taking the gears agent's box at the Albany local train while the train was laying over in that city for the night.

The Daily East Oregonian says that Pendleton has the reputation of being the most notoriously wild open town in the Northwest, and that there is a gang of the toughest characters in the country congregated there.

The Morning Astorian says there is immediate need of a number of new modern business buildings in Astoria—that some of the present merchants have outgrown their present locations and must have more room.

A bicyclist rider at Albany lost control of his wheel while going down the incline at the steel bridge and collided with a team. He did some grand and lefty tumbling that would put an acrobat out of business, but was not very severely hurt.

The sheriff raided an opium joint at Dayton, and captured a woman of the town, who was hitting the pipe, and arrested the chick who was running the joint. The woman was fined \$5 and costs, and the chick \$50, which both paid after spending a day in jail.

J. W. Cowen, a O. A. R. veteran, living at La Grande, while manufacturing a new kind of explosive powder, more powerful than dynamite, met with an accident while heating the stuff on a kitchen stove, and an explosion resulted which blew out the side of the kitchen and injured Mr. Cowen.

One morning last week a thousand pounds of mail matter was taken by the Corvallis stage from Albany to that city, consisting of fifteen sacks, of which six were seed potatoes shipped from the department of agriculture at Washington to the O. A. C. for experimental purposes, there being 40 varieties of European raised spuds.

A Test of Wine.

The watering of wine, or adulteration, by many liquids, or even solids, is infallibly told by the telephone, in the novel method of M. Manoeuvre of

Paris, says the American Spectator. Two glasses, one containing the wine to be tested, and the other the same quantity of wine known to be pure, are placed on an instrument resembling a pair of scales. The telephone is in contact with both liquids, and if both are pure no sound is heard, but if one contains water the telephone sounds until a pointer is moved to such a point on a dial that the conductivity of the liquids is equalized. The number indicated on the dial is then read when reference to a previously prepared chart shows the exact amount of water.

Perfumes of Flowers.

Higgin's apt, as Indian scientists say, "Frequently we find many different flowers in the same room, the various perfumes producing an effect analogous to that developed by aromatic substances. It is an exaggeration to say that such odors produce, especially when there is a predisposition already in existence, an excitement of the central machinery that is, they possess a true and peculiar hypnotic action. Among the flowers which particularly produce this effect may be included the hyacinth, tuberose, narcissus, peonies, heliotrope, pansies, lilacs, many orchids and various varieties of geraniums."
