Gambling Reopens

Astoria, Or., April 27.—After being closed for several weeks a number of the money slot machines were opened Tuesday night, and licenses were secured from the city for the quarter which ends on July 1st. A few gambling games were also opened, and it is understood that more will resume operations. No arrests have been made as yet, and the plan is to make a test case if any of the machine owners are arrested. Sheriff Liverville, who shut down the games and machines some weeks ago, is in Oregon City, attending the sessions of the circuit court, but before leaving stated that he would return this evening and Thursday would close the machines again. He said he did not intend to allow any gambling games to run, and if a fight is made he will enforce the law still more strictly by closing down the dance halls and enforcing the Sunday law.

British Banana Imports

During the year 1935, according to British official statistics, the imports of bananas into the United Kingdom amounted to 3,087,518 bunches, valued at \$2,824,714; imported from the Canary Islands, 1,041,472 bunches, valued at \$4,423,162; British West Indies, 682,883 bunches, valued at \$740,494; Costa Rica, first imports, 440,504 bunches, valued at \$608,825; Malacca, \$22,333.
