TALKS WITH FARMERS

Three Men Enjoying Good Old Age and Reading the Journal

John Cassidy out on the Garden road has most of his land in grass and runs sheep on it. He has just sold his clip to the Woolen Mills for 23 cents and says he felt so good over it he had to come in and take a drink and paid for the Weekly Journal for a year. Uncle John is crippled up a little from hard work, but says there is nothing that will kill an Irishman but for a mule to kick him. He is a rock-ribbed Democrat and says he will stay one if there are only three men left in the party.

John Savage, Sr., was in town today and is much improved in health. He has lost 20 pounds and has been on a pretty strict diet, but is now enjoying meeting his friends again and once in a while takes a drink for old time's sake. He has always been a Journal reader and has a wonderful memory, always bringing in his receipt and taking a new one and always knows exactly the date he has paid to. Uncle John says he takes The Journal in preference to any other paper because "It can out-lie all the rest of them."

Uncle Jimmy Elgin was in Saturday and called to see us. He is crippled up a little with rheumatism but mighty spry and in a short time when garden asparagus gets plenty will have the bloom back on his cheek. In his day he was one of the best looking men in Oregon, and for his age is not a bad looking today. He brought us a specimen of the Battle Creek hills black quartz from near Rosedale and said the following:

"To me it has the look of being rich in gold. Much of this black quartz is now being crushed and carted on the road between Salem and Rosedale. Every boulder in America, where it is finished ore as rich as this in the bright and shining gold, should go to the smelter instead of paving roadways. I have a report from an assayer who asserted that the specimen sent away \$46 to the ton, and the bright and shining metal did not stand out in bold relief, as this specimen does."

"It is not my intention of advertis-

ing these beautiful hills of Marion county for their health and wealth in agriculture and the purest, sweetest water that ever quenched the thirst of man, and now that it is known that the gold does exist in this black quartz, commonly known as iron ore, there should be a great future for the Red Hills country. Oregon is but a child in the manufactures. On the Aukney bottom lies a vast bed of fire clay which should be on exhibition at the Lewis and Clark fair. If these resources are not advertised how long will they lie dormant?

"Everywhere men of capital, brains and push are seeking these opportunities and would be willing to investigate this property. There is no land boom in this part of Marion county. There are but few offering their ranches for sale. Most of the ranchers are content with their holdings. Road work is progressing finely on the Hope Chapel hill. A force of about 40 convicts have been put on and they work well and the public will get the benefit. The most that we country people are to dread by the building of this beautiful boulevard will be its invitation to the many horse-frighteners of the automobile kind. But we old-timers of the plains that knew how to steer a prairie schooner or guide a fractious sore-footed bull, must keep up with the band wagon. It is of much pleasure to me to be living in this new world so far away from where I started 75 years ago. When on the frontiers of the west-men could be seen ploughing corn with wooden ploughs and hickory bark harness, but that is a story of the past."

Macleay Pomona Grange.

Marion County Pomona Grange met with Macleay recently and representatives from six granges were present and reported their respective granges growing. There were 235 present and a lively time from start to finish. Many resolutions were passed, most of them reaffirming action at former meetings. The failure of banks has renewed the desire for postal savings banks. The discrimination by our government in favor of lower charges on postage to foreign countries and higher rates for domestic service for our citizens is making a great many feel that they are not being fairly treated, so they are demanding a parcels post on the same terms that foreigners get theirs.
