POLK IS OUT OF DEBT.

Call is issued by County Treasurer Beezeley for All Outstanding Warrants.

Polk county is out of debt. County Treasurer Beezeley has issued a call for all outstanding warrants, and there will be a small cash balance in the treasury after these warrants are paid. The warrants included in this final call aggregate about \$34,000.

Five years ago, when Judge Sibley and Commissioner Teal were elected to office, the county was in debt to the amount of \$116,000. Of this sum, \$50,000 represented the cost of the new court house, and \$66,000 was old indebtedness. Before any taxes came into the treasury, the indebtedness reached \$130,000, the highest point in the history of the county. The county court, consisting of Judge Sibley and Commissioners Teal and Riggs, at once set about to pay this indebtedness, and at the end of their four years' term had reduced the amount to \$20,000. During these four years, the interests of the county were not neglected, and more permanent improvements were made than ever before. While constantly handicapped by the enormous debt and heavy interest charges, the court carried on the business of the county as usual, and, in addition, improved the roads, built bridges, and overlooked no important public need. At the end of their term of office, the county debt was \$110,000 less than it was when they took charge of affairs.

The present court continued the work of reducing the debt, and this year made a levy large enough to wipe out the balance and leave a neat sum in the treasury. Now, that the county is out of debt, there is no good reason why it should not keep out, unless some unforeseen emergency should arise.

SEATTLE BREWERIES TIED UP

Strikers Declare There is a Plan to Establish Open Shop Principles

Seattle, May 1.—All breweries in the Northwest were tied up by a strike at noon today, involving 2700 men, 1400 in Seattle alone. Employers have asked the sheriff to supply deputies to be stationed at the breweries to prevent violence. The strike was caused by the breweries refusing employment to men named by the union in rotation. The breweries don't refuse to employ union men, but the unions declare there is a plan on foot to make the breweries open shop concerns.

New Incorporations.

Articles of incorporation were today filed with the county clerk for the establishment of a church in Woodburn, to be known as the First Free Methodist church of Woodburn. The value of the property and money possessed by the church is placed at \$875. The trustees of the church are R. A. Trullinger, Theodore Rubens and James Lewis.

Last Saturday articles of incorporation were also filed by S. Phillips, of Kingston; F. Carter, of Stayton, and W. L. Freres, of Stayton, to establish a woolen mill plant in Stayton. The firm will be known as the Stayton Woolen Mill, and the capital stock is \$100,000, which is divided into shares of \$10 each.
