## SOUTHERN PACIFIC IMPROVES

### Lines in Oregon to the Tune of Half a Million

(Independence West.)  
 This paper is pleased to publish the announcement that \$1,500,000 is to be expended in Oregon this year of 1905 in improvements of the Southern Pacific lines. It means an added stimulus to business in the state. About \$900,000 of the amount will be paid out for labor. The improvements will include replacing present rails with heavy steel, ballasting and replacing wooden bridge with structures of steel. This action on the part of the railroad company will have a tendency to win for Messrs. Worthington, Coman and Fields the confidence of the people of Oregon for it is along the line of accomplishments for which they are striving. The road-it should be remembered, does not belong to these gentlemen. They are merely entrusted with looking after the Oregon end of it. In the past, local managers have been compelled to follow out a general policy of expending as little as possible on Oregon roads. The decision to spend a million and a half this year would indicate a change in policy may be at hand. If Messrs. Worthington, Coman and Fields and others, through their efforts and representations have been instrumental in bringing about the change, they have done a good work for the state. Railroads are indispensable in the development of a country and it is highly desirable that the railroad management and people work in hearty co-operation rather than continuous strife.  
 Where a road is owned by Wall Street and foreign bondholders as the Oregon road is, it is essential to the interests of the state and the corporation that the people and local managers for the road, understand each other and work in harmony. The people want to feel that they have in the local managers, advocates of their interests before the corporation directors whose policies so vitally effect the state. It is results that count and one is scored for Mr. Worthington and his associates in the announcement that something is to be done next year but this.


