STATE NEWS

The Forest Grove brass band has commenced to give open air concerts.

Three federal live stock inspectors are located in the territory tributary to Pendleton.

A Philharmonic Music Society, composed of 30 members, has been organized at Pendleton.

Nearly all the gamblers who formerly made Pendleton their headquarters have left that city.

The proprietor of the Depot saloon at Oregon City had his license revoked for selling liquor to minors.

The faculty of the Pacific University at Forest Grove has changed the course of Latin study from four years to two. John Krebs, an employee of the O. R. & N. at Meacham, committed suicide by shooting himself in the head and abdomen.

In the vicinity of La Grande 3900 acres have been seeded to sugar beets this season, an increase of 100 acres more than any previous season.

By an order issued from the secretary of the interior sportsmen are prohibited from hunting on the Umatilla Indian reservation. No permits will be issued by the agent.

During the past year at the Oregon Agricultural college there has been an enrollment of 700, and of this number 640 have been taking the regular courses.

At a meeting of the faculty of the University of Oregon recently, the rules for eligibility to athletic teams were modified to such an extent that all students in the college are eligible. Heretofore an extra high standard of scholarship has been demanded of the varsity athletes but the new rules require nothing more than a regular bona fide attendance, and a successful completion of nine hours work during the previous semester.

PERFORMING BEARS.

Norris and Rowe's Circus Show at Salem Monday.

In the Norris and Rowe collection of trained wild animals they are exhibiting this year, in their greater circus is a troupe of trained Siberian bears. Animal trainers can testify to the fact of the Siberian bear being the fiercest largest, most blood thirsty and intractable of all the bear tribe. It is not so very long ago that animal trainers refused to even attempt to subdue the Siberian bear and as they are the most costly of all bears, circus owners would not purchase any. Bartel, the celebrated animal importer of New York, was fortunate enough to secure a troupe of magnificent specimens of these fierce brutes, but could not find a purchaser on account of the great price necessary and the unwillingness of professional trainers to handle them, however, Messrs. Norris and Rowe heard Bartel's lucky purchase and determined to acquire the bears. Clarence Norris went to New York and purchased the brutes as soon as he saw them. Bringing them to the winter quarters of the show, he set about their education. It was a long, hazardous undertaking, but he finally succeeded in training them to walk, to box, to wrestle, to play see-saw with bloodhounds, to lay on their backs and juggle barrels and pyramids, to ride bicycles, and to dine at the table with him. The teaching of these bears to accomplish their sensational feats is considered to be the very zenith of wild animal training. The bears are securely muzzled at every performance so no harm can come to the auditors. This season the Norris and Rowe Greater Circus is giving a gigantic display of aerial, aerial, terrestrial achievements, zoological exhibits, and hippodromatic triumphs. The fourth biggest circus in the entire world will exhibit at Salem, Monday May 8, at 2 and 8 P. M.

Oregon City, Ore., May 5.—Mayor Sommer has been authorized by the city council to name a committee, of which he and City Attorney Franklin T. Griffith shall be members, to prepare a revised freight franchise for the Oregon Water Power & Railway company that shall be agreeable to both the railway company and the people of Oregon City.

ROCKY MOUNTAINS IN THE WRONG PLACE?

The professors at John D. Rockefeller's Standard Oil university have made many sensational statements, but it has remained for Prof. Goode to say that the Creator made a bad job of the continent of North America. Prof. Goode believes he could have constructed a much better continent himself.

Lecturing before the senior students of the Midway school, Dr. Goode said: "The greatest defect with the continent is the Rocky mountains. As mountains the Rockies are all right, first class in every particular. But their situation is a woeful handicap to the productivity of the United States, Canada and Mexico."

"It is not merely a question of the ground they occupy being wasted. The Rockies make a large part of the great western plain barren waste, fit for nothing. The prevailing winds in the United States are westerly, and blowing off the Pacific they are laden with moisture."

"Their journey from the Pacific, however, is short, for they strike the tendency in this direction."

Rockies and lose their moisture, thus making barren thousands of square miles of land that would be as fertile if not more so than the richest soil in Illinois.

"Now, if I were making a continent like North America, I would place the Rockies way up north in Northern Canada. That's where they belong. They would lose none of their attractiveness from a viewpoint of beauty."

"And then, chiefly, they could do no damage. Northern Canada is a barren waste, almost entirely unproductive. Of how much more benefit to the country and the world in general would it be if there were only uplands in place of the Rockies?"

Dr. Goode, in the course of his lecture, expressed his belief in less than 150 years New York and Chicago would be linked together as one city by a wonderful chain of suburbs. He declared that the rapid building of the interurban lines, the branching out of the electric railways, the vast improvement in the steam railroad, showed a tendency in this direction.
