Glendale, on the Mountain Divide

Full of Business Vim, Good People and Possibilities

Everybody who travels up and down the Southern Pacific knows where Glendale is located and knows more or less about that thrifty community. It has grown from a little wood camp until it is a good town with numerous business houses, public schools, lodges, church and social organizations, besides having one of the most noted hotels in the state. Glendale might be called an annex to Salem if it were not so far away, for it has a large Salem colony of business people. The latest acquisition from here is the firm of Harding & Bowersox, composed of E. J. Harding and F. O. Bowersox, who are conducting a general merchandise business there. Hon. H. G. Sonnemann is one of the pioneer business men who came from Salem. He has a large general merchandise or department store and has been most prosperous in his new home. B. L. Darby, a son of W. H. Darby, has a fine drug store in Sonnemann's new brick block. Dr. Bowersox, who went from here to Glendale, has removed to Jacksonville and is now in the east taking a post-graduate course in medicine. There are also the four Jones boys who formerly lived near the Swartz sawmills east of Salem, and their kinsman, W. A. Marshall, formerly of Salem. But Salem isn't quite the whole thing, for Glendale has many hospitable, active people from all parts of the world.

While the place is not large, it is always bustling and growing. They are now talking of having the main streets of the town properly graded and improved, and there is also talk of water works. For the latter, the water can be obtained from Section creek, which belongs to the Sol Abrams estate, and runs just above the town. From thence a good gravity system could be built at small expense, and everybody in the town feels the need of protection against fire.

Glendale is a central point for considerable mining activity and is the natural outlet for the Greenback, Martha, Goldbug, Benton and Kramer, and other good mines. Besides this and the logging and wood interests there is a good farming industry being developed in little valleys around about.

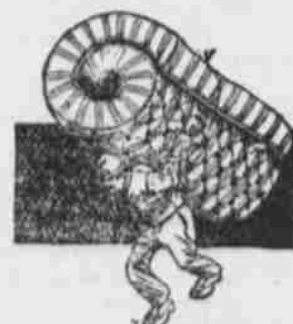
Former Salem Woman Dead.

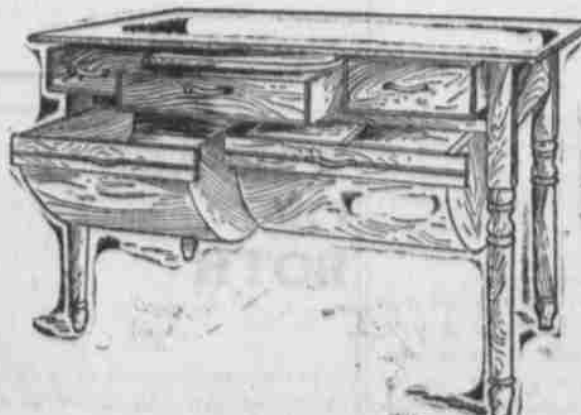
