Every day at noon, and after school is out in the evening, large numbers of school boys, between ages of 10 and 15 years, loiter around the tracks, and catch the trains switching back and forth. Only yesterday a small boy narrowly escaped death under the car wheels, while endeavoring to board a swiftly-moving train. He attempted to catch the rear platform of the caboose, but the momentum of the train threw him headlong, and had there been any other cars following he would assuredly have been killed.

Measures should be taken by the parents of these children, or any one with power to do so, to stop this hazardous pastime.

FRUIT GROWERS MEET

After a thorough discussion the fruit growers meeting at the city hall Saturday resolved to investigate a co-operative plan of running a cannery.

A committee was appointed composed of W. C. Price, George Weeks and Gröve Hensley to visit the co-operative concern near Newberg, and make a report on the facts as to its success or failure.

It was stated that many co-operative creameries had proven failures but that will not prevent an investigation into the plan that has been successfully followed at Newberg for two years.

A strict set of rules is issued by the Hazelwood Cream Co., of Portland, for the guidance of dairymen from whom its cream supply is obtained. When these rules are violated, the cream is not accepted for the grade of Hazelwood butter or ice cream.
