CIRCUS COMES TO TOWN

Stunt by the Elephants Not on the Bills

Salem's Wide Streets Gave Fine Opportunity for Parade

When the long train conveying Norris & Rowe's monster circus arrived here early Sunday morning the usual crowd of the curious who happened to be at the depot witnessed a most interesting performance that is not down on the printed program. The three large elephants were the actors and participants in the exhibition, and for a short time they furnished all the amusement that was going.

The names of the animals are Nero, Fargo and Dutchess. Having been confined on the journey for so long they were, of course, anxious to tread the solid earth, and so, when the opportunity was given, they all rushed pell mell from the car out onto the level green in front of the depot. After the long confinement they revelled in the freedom of the opening, running about and trumpeting in an ecstasy of glee. When they had enjoyed themselves for a few minutes in this manner they espied the grove of oaks growing on the edge of the race, and, with one accord, made for it. Grasping a tree with their powerful trunks, they would seem to take a childish delight in tugging and exerting their whole strength in an endeavor to pull the whole tree down. Of course, even with their enormous strength they could not accomplish their object, but still the efforts they made in the attempts proved an interesting diversion to the spectators. Finding that their efforts in this direction were unavailing they turned their attention to pulling the branches from the trees and devouring the fresh green leaves, which, no doubt, seemed a luxury as compared with their customary fare of dry hay.

The scent of the water soon attracted their attention, and, as an elephant dearly loves water, they were not long in finding their way to the desired spot. Plunging in they would kneel down, as the water was shallow, and allow it to run over their backs, splashing trumpeting, and evincing every sign of supreme enjoyment. Then they seemed to take a pleasure in playing tricks on one another, coming up stealthily behind the Dutchess, "Old Nero" suddenly gave her a powerful shove, that sent her headlong into the stream. No offense was taken at this act of Nero's, and the fun continued until the "bull" man came and led the three animals back to where already the huge canvas tents were going up, and chained them to the customary stakes. A little hay was then given them and they soon settled down, quiet and solemn-looking as if they never thought of such a thing as play.

The Parade a Success.

The first circus of the season was fittingly ushered in by a big street parade this morning. As the season is early, the equipment of the show has had no chance to show the wear and tear of the road, so everything is new, big and bright. The splendid street demonstration showed how greatly this favorite attraction has grown since last year. There was a large crowd on hand to witness the cavalcade. This afternoon a large crowd has assembled under the white tents, and they are evidently enjoying circus day to the full extent. The sensational bareback riding acts added to the show since last season adds greatly to the attractiveness of the program, especially the expert horsemanship of, dainty Rose Dockrill, the somersaulting on horseback of George Holland, the two-horse carrying act of Frank and Dolly Miller, the hurricane jockey and hurdle riding of August King, and the equestrian feats of Herbert Rumley, Estelle Settler and M'le Julliene. The mid-air and acrobatic feats of the six marvelous Bellford troupe, Melonotte, LaNole and Melonotte on the elevated silver wire, the Aerial Weavers, the Sibbon Sisters on the flying trapeze, the flying Banvards, the McDonald trio of daring bicyclists, the Gardner troupe in a mid-air casting act, the Segimoto Japanese lady acrobats, swordswomen and fencers, and many other acts of this nature proved a veritable feast of circus novelties. The hippodrome races are thrilling and exciting enough for any one, so realistically are they run. A score of clowns headed by the famous "Happy Billy" La Rue, "Bill Scott" and his trained pig, "Cheerful Tote" Duerow and the grotesque Oliphants.
