PROGRAM
FOR MAY 30

At a committee meeting held at the residence of J. Q. Barnes on Monday night, the sub-committees on Memorial day services reported that matters were progressing finely, and that arrangements were practically completed for the occasion.

The observance of Memorial day will begin on Friday afternoon, on May 26th, in the several public schools of the city, where appropriate programs will be rendered by the pupils, and addresses made by visiting veterans of the Civil War. On Sunday, May 28th, the Grand Army Post and other veterans will attend divine service at the Unitarian church, and listen to a patriotic sermon by Rev. F. A. Powell and appropriate music from the choir.

On Tuesday, Memorial day proper, the veterans will meet at the G. A. R. rooms, corner of Commercial and Perry streets, at 1 p. m., sharp, and form for a short parade through the streets of the city, in which they will be led by the Salem Military Band, and escorted by Company M, Second regiment, O. N. G., and accompanied by any and all civic and social organizations that may desire to unite with them in the proper observance of the day. Immediately after the parade they will proceed to City View cemetery, where the ceremony of dedicating the new \$1000 monument will be performed, after which will follow the usual ritualistic observances of the Grand Army of the Republic. Committees will also attend to the distribution of flowers upon the graves of deceased soldiers.

PLAINTIFF
GETS VERDICTR. R. Ryan & Co. Gets Verdict
for \$29 Against S.
A. Townsend

The hearing of the case of R. R. Ryan & Co., real estate dealers, against S. A. Townsend, et ux., was concluded yesterday in Justice of the Peace H. H. Turner's court, after the jury had been out for two hours. The verdict was in favor of the plaintiff. This is the first case in Salem that it has ever been necessary to try twice, because of the jury being unable to agree, and for this reason attracted a good deal of attention, locally. The dispute arose over the refusal of the defendants to pay the sum of \$29, alleged to be due the plaintiff in part payment for the consummation of the sale of defendant's farm by them.

About a year ago, Townsend the defendant, purchased the above named farm from a person by the name of Cleveland. The sale was negotiated by Ryan & Co., at that time, so that when, last January, Townsend decided to sell his farm, he naturally went to Ryan, and disposed of the farm through him. He agreed to pay Ryan \$50 for negotiating the sale, and shortly after he had sold the property paid \$21 of the amount to Ryan, but refused to pay the remaining \$29, giving as a reason that Ryan was responsible for certain wood supposed to have been on the farm when the place was sold. At the time Ryan gave Townsend notice that he would sue him for the remaining \$29, and at once took action to recover the amount due. At the first trial the jury failed to agree, so that a second trial was necessary to decide the case. This took place yesterday afternoon, with the aforementioned result. Many witnesses were examined, and their examination, together with hearing the arguments of the respective attorneys, consumed the entire afternoon. The jury returned their verdict at 7 o'clock last evening.

Marshal Cornelius and Sheriff Culver yesterday evening arrested a man who had been staying at a boarding house on Front street, on complaint of the landlady of the place, who said he would not pay his room rent, nor would he vacate his room. The man's name was Victor Erixon, and he gave his age as 34 years.

Previous to engaging rooms on Front street Erixon boarded at the Riverside boarding house, on West State street. He was compelled to leave the place, however, as he insisted upon making love to the daughter of his landlady. His proposals were not taken very seriously at first, but as the man still persisted in his unwelcome attentions upon the young lady, and, in addition, would not pay for his board, he ordered to leave, whereupon he vacated his rooms and found lodgings elsewhere. This did not put a stop toward Erixon's attentions toward the daughter, and his actions finally became so peculiar that it was thought his mind was deranged. Erixon will be held in the city jail for a few days, and later an examination will be held as to his sanity. If he still shows signs of mental aberration he will probably be committed to the asylum.
