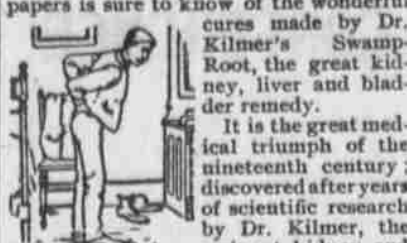

SENATOR DOLLIVER IN A ROIT

The Iowa Senator Gets Mixed up in the Chicago Teamsters Strike

Rioting incidental to the teamsters' strike is declared to have been responsible for the battle-scarred appearance of United States Senator Dolliver of Iowa, who attended a hearing of the interstate commerce committee in Washington looking as if he had gone through several rounds in the prize ring.

The senator was in Chicago and got mixed up in a riot on Clark street. He was so badly battered up that the services of a physician were required to patch up some of his cuts and bruises. His countenance was badly disfigured in the encounter.

Called to Iowa some time ago by the death of his father, Senator Dolliver on his return trip to Washington stopped in Chicago between trains. He had occasion to go to one of the ticket offices on Clark street to get his transportation. His curiosity was aroused by reports of turbulent scenes in the streets, and having plenty of time to await the departure of his train for the east the senator took a stroll along Clark street toward the North side.

There did not appear to be any excitement on the streets, and the distinguished visitor soon forgot all about the strike. Presently he saw two innocent looking wagons coming toward him. A moment later he found himself in the midst of a howling mob of infuriated teamsters and strike sympathizers. The animus of the crowd seemed to be directed toward the drivers of the wagons at first, but an instant later the fighting became general in the street.

Men were thrown down and tramped upon, clubs were used, brick bats and other missiles flew thick and fast, and several pistol shots rang out. Senator Dolliver struggled manfully, and it was only because of his giant stature and strong physique that he was able to keep his feet. He knew that if he went down the results would be serious.

Putting forth all the energy he possessed the senator managed to break through the crowd and escaped much the worse for wear. He sustained several bad bruises as a result of the experience.
