Six Colleges Represented at Annual Intercollegiate Meet in Oklahoma

Oklahoma City, Okla., May 19.—The presence of large delegations of students and other visitors here today is indicative of the keen interest manifested in the annual meeting and contests of the Intercollegiate Athletic and Oratorical Association of Oklahoma. The annual field meet takes place this afternoon, with 14 events on the athletic program, and this evening the chosen orators of the several institutions will meet in a forensic tilt. There are six colleges represented in the meet: Stillwater, Alva, Kingfisher, Edmond, Norman and Weatherford.

WILL TRY THEM AT JULY TERM

Cases of Charles Monte and Harry Wright Postponed to July Term

Department No. 1, of the circuit court, met yesterday afternoon, Judge Burnett presiding. The case of Charles Monte and Harry Wright, charged with murder in the first degree, came up at this time. P. H. D'Arcy, attorney for Wright, appeared in behalf of Monte also, as H. J. Bigger, Monte's attorney, was out of the city. The trial of these two men was to have taken place next Monday, but the state appearing in the person of Deputy District Attorney Charles McNary asked that the hearing of the cases be postponed until the beginning of the July term of court, which is the second Monday in that month. The prosecution stated that on account of the unforeseen illness of District Attorney John McNary they asked the court for further time. Attorney P. H. D'Arcy then moved for a postponement of the case until that time, on the grounds that he would in this time be able to procure the presence of certain witnesses necessary to his side of the case. In view of the mutual wish of both sides that the case be postponed until the July term, Judge Burnett granted the continuance. Both Monte and Wright were present, guarded by Sheriff Culver, Deputy Sheriff Minto, and a deputy warden from the penitentiary.

An Artistic Slab.

One of the finest samples of wood that will go from Benton county to the Lewis and Clark fair is a slab from Alsea, prepared by two of the oldest residents of that section. The slab is three feet long, two or three inches thick, and set in a base. SOME ARE THROWN OUT

Three List of Counties Thrown Out in the Referendum Petition

The petitions for the referendum of the general appropriation bill, which was filed yesterday with the secretary of state, has been carefully gone over, and the names which were not properly certified stricken out. The list, when filed yesterday, contained a total of 7920 names, but after the clerks of the office had thoroughly inspected it there remained only 6312 names. The lists of those who had signed the petition in the counties of Grant, Curry and Douglas were thrown out altogether, because of improper certification. The number of signers in these three counties was luckily very small, only amounting to 175 names. In the other counties there were many names stricken out. Below is a list of the respective counties, with the number of signers in each county when the petition was filed, and also the number after they had been corrected:

CONTRACTS ARE LET.

Salem Man Gets Two Contracts for Improvements on Capitol Building.

The state board of building commissioners met yesterday afternoon and let the contract for the improvement of the state capitol building. C. A. Gray, of this city, was awarded the contract for the repairing and waterproofing of the dome of the building for \$1830, and also the contract for painting the superstructure and roof, at a price of \$2998.80, the price bid. W. P. Fuller & Co., of Portland, was given the contract for furnishing the paint to be used. His bid was the lowest, being but \$1.10 a gallon.

The contract for the cement and concrete which will be used in the construction of the walk on the east side of the building, was not awarded yesterday. Architect D. D. Neer, of Portland, drafted the specifications, and will have charge of the work, which will begin at once, upon his giving the contractors notice. The work must be completed within 60 days from the time notice is served. The color of the basement part of the building will be a French gray, and the superstructure a buff color, with the windows a dark olive.

Game Called Off.

The game which was to have been played between the Salem high school baseball team and that of the Eugene high school, yesterday at Eugene was called off on account of the ruling of the faculty of the latter institution. No notice was given to the Salem club of the calling off of the game, and they left at noon for Eugene, to find, when they arrived, the condition of things. Notwithstanding that they could not play with the high school team, they arranged a game to be played today with the university boys.

The Eugene Divinity School will close the tenth year of its existence next Wednesday, the 25th, when the annual graduating exercises will be held.

WILL PLAY ANYWAY.

Eugene High School Boys Will Use Old Suits and Play Ball.

Eugene Guard: The high school boys, undaunted by the unreasonable ruling of the executive committee, forbidding further baseball in the school this year, will continue to play during the summer, but not under the title of the Eugene High School team. They will wear last year's uniforms and play in them. A number of good games will yet be played here. The business men of Eugene helped to buy the suits for the high school baseball team, and now the suits have been locked up, and the boys refused access to them, because of a breach of orders on the part of the management of the team. This action on the part of the executive committee of the school has received the condemnation of those who put up for the team's paraphernalia and of many others interested in baseball. The boys have the sympathy of a majority of the people of the city.

Killed in Paper Mill.

Ogden Hudson was instantly killed at Lebanon Thursday morning at the paper mill. Hudson worked in the pit, and had gone into the carrier to clean out the pulp. Ralph Goodrich, brother-in-law of Hudson, started the machinery, catching Hudson, and throwing him out, breaking his neck.

This is the first person ever killed at the Lebanon paper mill. Hudson was born in Iowa. He was 45 years of age, and leaves a wife and son.
