TO RAISE BIG MONEY

Fifty Million to Be Raised to Fight the "Beef Trust"

Two hundred thousand meat workers are to be assessed to raise \$50,000,000 to fight the "beef trust" and drive it out of business if possible. The officers of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of America have come to the conclusion that it would be impossible to win another strike against the "beef trust" for fifteen years at least. Homer D. Call, national secretary of the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of America, will confer with the general organizer, Mr. Eichelberger, concerning the establishment of a national co-operative slaughtering and packing system to compete with the trust. Mr. Eichelberger said: "We will fight the 'beef trust' by establishing slaughtering and packing houses on the co-operative plan. We have been experimenting with the system in San Francisco and our experiment has proved successful, the plant doing a business of over \$150,000 a month. A millionaire ranch owner, who is against the trust, is selling us cattle. It is proposed that 200,000 meat workers in America be assessed for ten years until \$50,000,000 has been raised. This is better than losing millions of dollars in wages in an unsuccessful strike. Since the 'beef trust' has an invested capital of \$100,000,000, about \$50,000,000 will be required to successfully compete with it."

GROUND SHOULD BE IMPROVED

Suggestion to State Fair Officials

Work in the Right Direction Would Make a Beautiful Place

There is to be no state fair this year, and the State Fair Board will expend \$15,000 in improving the grounds and buildings of that great state institution. The mortgage has been lifted, the property is clear, and a handsome bunch of money is on hand for putting the institution in first-class shape. It is understood that some grading will be done inside, and that the sewer will be perfected in order to bring about better sanitary conditions. Some new buildings will be put up and all the others will be improved, painted and a general clean-up is on the program.

A Journal representative would like to suggest a few other things that should be looked after, viz.: The camp grounds outside, as well as the groves of shade trees on the inside. To start with, the camp ground should be cleaned up, every dirty old shack should be torn down and all the others should be painted, white washed, renovated and made respectable. Specific rules should be adopted for the kind of cottages to be built and the way they are to be maintained. All the dead trees and limbs in the camp grounds should be removed. The ditches and uneven places should be filled up and graded. If necessary, the entire camp grounds should be cultivated, graded and seeded down. Such work could be done this year, and a good sod produced before the ground would again be used by the public. The fences should be put in first-class order. Live stock should be kept from running at large in these camp grounds, and they

should be made the most attractive piece of real estate along the line of company has put up a neat depot and maintains respectable grounds, and the State Fair Association certainly should put everything else in keeping therewith. These grounds should be made so attractive that hundreds of campers and cottagers would be attracted to every future fair.

The sanitary features should be taken fully into consideration, and this should be made the most desirable camp grounds in Oregon. No doubt the State Fair Board has some of these suggestions in mind, and contemplates making these improvements, but the suggestion is made in good faith and can do no harm. The moral effect of a first-class clean up, and a higher standard of cleanliness in the future will be of untold value to the state fair.

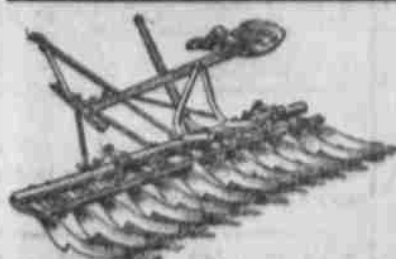
