Randall handles the \$10,000 appropriation by congress to pay the expense of the congressional party to attend the exposition at Portland.

THE BIG SEA RACE.

Interest in the big trans-Atlantic yacht race from Sady Hook to The Lizard, now on, is not confined to the devotees of sport; it is of substantial interest to the great ship building industry of the world and it means much to the great profession of seamanship.

The yachts in this race across the sea are not trick boats built for jockeying. The international yacht races of recent years have been contests between vessels of similar type constructed with mathematical nicety for speed regardless of endurance, and sailed under strict rules which put a premium on clever jockeying and minor tricks of seamanship.

The present race is a wholly different matter. The contestants will have to meet a thorough test in all phases of the seaman's art. They are free to take their choice of ocean lanes and for days together they will have to study how to make the most of their opportunities. It is seamanship of the highest type that is put to the test. The nation whose boat wins such a contest will have substantial cause to boast of its eminence in seamanship.

The boats are real boats fitted for real deep sea sailing. Whatever advantage in construction one may be found to have over the others will be a practical advantage worthy perhaps of adoption in general shipbuilding.

As a trial of seamanship and of skill in the designing and construction of boats this contest far exceeds in importance any other held in recent years.
