

PREPARE FOR KING ALFONSO

The Spanish King Will Be Given a Royal Welcome in France

Paris, May 27.—Because of the prospect that it may have important political and commercial results, France is awaiting with eagerness the approaching visit of King Alfonso, who, accompanied by the Spanish minister of foreign affairs and other distinguished Spanish officers, will cross the French frontier on Tuesday morning. It will be the young king's first journey beyond the confines of his own kingdom. From the frontier until he reaches Paris King Alfonso and his entourage will see decorations, including the entwined arms of France and Spain, which

the enthusiastic French peasants have raised at almost every station. On arriving in Paris his majesty will be received at the railway station by President and Mme. Loubet, the presidents of the senate and chamber of deputies, and other high officials of the republic. French soldiers in their striking uniforms will surround the station and stretch in two long lines along the flag-bedecked Bois de Boulogne, through the Arcade Triomphe, and Champs de Elysees to the Place de la Concorde, where a battery will add its thunder to the official welcome. Between the lines of troops King Alfonso, accompanied by the French president and Mme. Loubet, will drive to the Palace of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, where he will be lodged during the greater portion of his stay. The apartments have been exquisitely furnished, and the king will sleep in the bed used by Napoleon. On the day of his arrival the King will dine at the Palace of the Elysee, the president's residence. On Wednesday he will drive through the streets of Paris, accompanied by the Spanish ambassador and M. Loubet's aide-de-

camp, receiving the Spanish colony at the embassy subsequently. In the evening there will be a gala performance at the opera, in which some of the most distinguished artists in France will appear. There will be military exercises at the Chalons school on Thursday, and a reception at the Elysee at night. The king will visit the cavalry school at Saint Cyr, and will return by road by way of Versailles, Saint Cloud and the Bois de Boulogne. A gala performance will be given at the Comedie Francaise, which he will attend with M. Loubet. On Saturday there will be a review of the Paris garrison and in the evening the king will meet the presidents and ministers at a dinner given by the Spanish ambassador. He will accompany President Loubet to the Auteuil races on Sunday and dine with M. Delcasse at the Quai d'Orsay, leaving at midnight for Cherbourg, where he will receive salutes from a squadron assembled there.

In a Live Snappy Game Yesterday Afternoon Williamette Is Defeated

Salem High School 9, Willamette University 6. These were the figures that decided the fate of Salem high school and "Old Williamette" yesterday afternoon on the local University campus. A game had been scheduled with the Albany high school team, but, for some reason, best known to themselves, they did not appear, and in lieu of this a game was arranged with the redoubtable high school lads with the men from Williamette.

In order to save Jerman for the game with Mount Angel today, the University switched Nace from shortstop to the pitcher's box, and shoved Jerman into Nace's place. The change proved disastrous for them in the end, for Nace was on the sick list, and in no condition for filling the responsible position of pitcher, and, of course, was hit for a number of costly bingles at critical times; still had he been accorded the support given J. King the score would not have been as it is. For live, snappy playing and better team work the high school deserved its victory. Every minute from the start until the finish they were in the game, and for this reason they are entitled to their laurels.

Carey, the high school first baseman, was the heavy hitter for his team. Five times up, every one of which counted for a hit. The right field fence seemed to be his special mark, and three times he sent the sheroed flying over the top, bringing in runs each time.
