

TO PLANT SELECTED OYSTERS

Ninety Barrels of Young Oysters to Be Planted in Yaquina Bay

A refrigerator car, containing 90 barrels of young oysters from Delaware bay, passed through this city yesterday noon, bound for Yaquina City, says the Albany Herald. The car was consigned to J. D. Wilcox and William Toner and their associates, owners of the oyster beds at Oysterville. The shipment consisted of selected oysters, all of them being chosen for the virility, and they will at once be placed on the beds prepared for them. The freight on the car from the Atlantic seaboard to Yaquina was nearly \$500. The car was taken to Lincoln county by the bay train yesterday, and last evening, on arrival there, a barge was brought alongside the wharf on which the car was stopped, the oysters were immediately unloaded, and this morning will be taken to the beds for planting.

A year ago the same parties brought out a carload of oysters from the East and planted them at the oysterville beds, and recent examinations showed that they had grown nicely and are in a healthy condition. Mr. Toner, in speaking of the industry yesterday noon, stated that they expected to be able to place their first oysters, grown from the young oysters brought here from the East last year, on the market by next winter, and in the course of another year they will have ample supply to prove that the Eastern oysters can be acclimated at Yaquina bay. This makes three carloads of Eastern oysters planted in Yaquina bay by private enterprise and the experiment has already proven a success and promises to build up an industry that will be of great value to that part of the state.

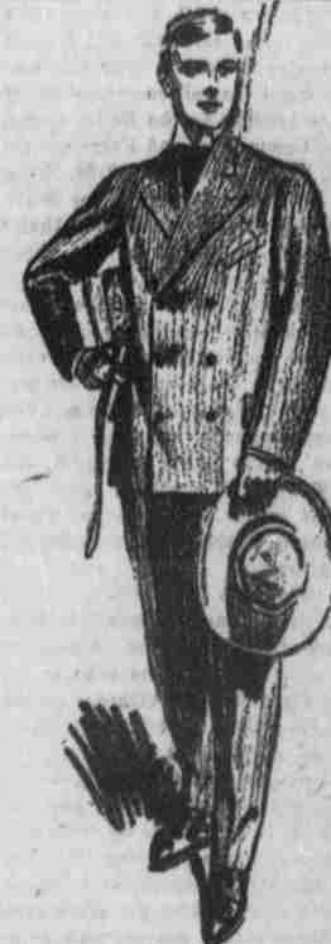
