It is fitting that Salem's contribution of flowers tomorrow should be an example of Nature's bounteous gifts to her, and of Salem's veneration for those old soldiers who have gone over to the other side. The bitterness of our civil strife is a thing of the past, and north and south, east and west, the whole people, show their respect to those who fell in the fratricidal strife. It is peculiarly fitting that the graves of the unknown dead and those who sleep far from relatives of friends should receive attention. For this reason it is urged that all contributions of flowers be brought to the Relief Corps, corner of Commercial and Ferry streets Tuesday, but not later than 9:30. Bring them in profusion, for in the far South fair hands will lay, with sympathetic tears, flowers on the graves of those who came in amity to sleep in peace.

The unknown dead on Southern battlefields, whose stiffened corpses found hurried and unceremonious burial, each year awoken in the hearts of their survivors yet tender recollections. Beneath the magnolia and the cypress, cut down in the flower of youth, the pride of many a Northern household sleeps, his grave unknown to those whose hearts broke when he returned not unto them.

They fell where duty called, the old man and the young; he who left both wife and little ones, the music of whose voices shall find no echo in his ears forever more; the vigorous grand-sire, whose pulses beat with youthful force, and who forgot the weight of years at duty's call; the youth, beardless, but brave, his mother's kiss yet fresh on his lips—all side by side, here found a resting place.
