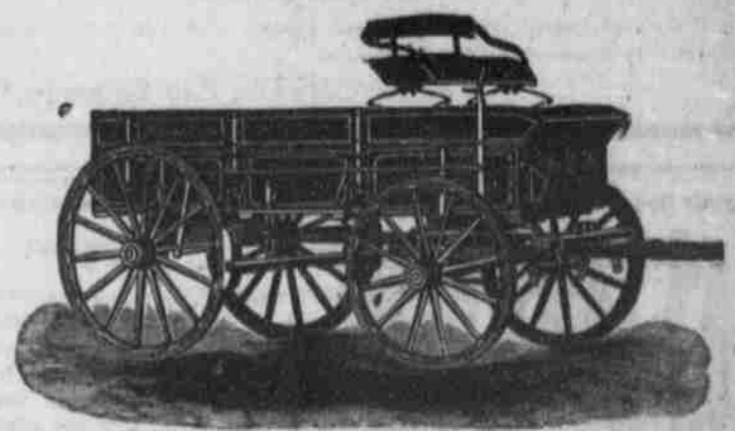

ABOUT TORNADES.

They Have Occurred in All Parts of the United States.

St. Louis Globe-Democrat: Tornadoes are more frequent in the southwestern part of the United States than elsewhere in this country, and the sun-spot theory does not fit this localization of storms. There is also in the distant southwest an extremely hot region, where superheated strata of air set in early and prevail for months. As they travel toward the northwest, they strike cool currents, and the resulting commotion can be easily understood. But tornadoes have occurred in all sections. There was one in Massachusetts in 1890 that killed nine persons and injured 40, cutting a path 200 feet wide through the town of South Lawrence. Several months earlier in the same year a storm wrecked 900 buildings in Louisville, Ky., killing 67 persons and injuring 200. In the 75 years preceding 1881 the tornadoes in the United States, of which an account was preserved, numbered over 600, of which two-thirds were confined to the months of April, May, June and July.
