EXPENSE TO SEE THE FAIR

Average Cost per Day for Five Days or Ten Days

Visitors at the Lewis and Clark exposition in Portland this summer will be surprised to find how cheaply the big fair may be seen. The expenses of a trip depends largely, of course, upon the individual who makes the trip, but a schedule of the fixed expense has been prepared, which enables one to get a fairly accurate idea of the cost of seeing the exposition.

The visitor in Portland will find an abundance of suitable accommodations, and it may be said authoritatively that no one need pay in excess of one dollar a night for clean, comfortable lodgings. Within the past few months temporary hotels and lodging houses with a grand total of 2670 rooms have been erected near the main entrance to the grounds, while the American Inn, within the grounds, has 586 rooms. In addition to these accommodations, the Hill Military Academy and St. Helen's Hall will be available, while most every house in the district between the downtown portion of Portland and the exposition will take lodgers during the summer. In most cases accommodations may be found within easy walking distance of the grounds, and a five-cent street car ride is available from any part of the city. While the average price charged for lodging will be one dollar per night per person, many rooms may be obtained, especially in the temporary hotels near the grounds, for 75, 50 or even 25 cents.

Most people will find it more convenient to take breakfast at their lodgings than at a downtown restaurant. Twenty-five cents should pay for breakfast, and 25 cents for luncheon within the grounds, while for the evening meal 50 cents may be considered a fair price, making the cost of three meals one dollar.

Admission to the grounds costs 50 cents, and an allowance of a similar sum should be made for incidentals, which include admissions to several attractions on the Trail, the amusement street.

The schedule of expenses per day for the average person of economy then, is as follows:

Lodging, per day	\$1.00
Meals	1.00
Admission	.50
Trail shows, etc.	.50

This schedule is on the basis of a five-day stay at the fair. All who can possibly do so should plan to spend at least ten days, however. For these the expenses need not be quite so heavy per day, as it may be possible to get rooms at a lower rate by engaging them for a week or more, and the entire expense per day may be reduced to \$2.50. The person who spends the longer period should take advantage of the opportunity to view some wonderful scenery within a short distance of Portland. A five-cent fare by street car takes one to Portland heights, where a wonderful fine view of the city, the Willamette and Columbia rivers and the snow-capped mountains may be enjoyed. Other delightful, but inexpensive trips, include a visit by street car to City Park and a ride on the Willamette river by boat. The costs of these trips may be deducted from the 50 cents a day allotted for Trail attractions and souvenirs, since the total expense for these features need not exceed the \$2.50 laid aside in figuring the cost of the five-day trip.

Figuring as above, then, the expenses of a five day and a ten-day stay at the fair may be reckoned as follows:

Railroad fare	2.50

Total necessary expenses \$27.20

\$8,000 IN TWO DAYS

Rich Strike of Wire Gold Made in the Opp Mine

With \$8,000 taken out in the first two days after the strike in the Opp mine, in Jackson county, and the rich ore promising to continue, the find in this once-rejected mine looks like a bonanza equal to the famous Gold Hill ore of early days. Should the rich streak continue twenty feet, which will apparently be the case, it will yield at least \$150,000. The ledge is seemingly a continuous one of wire-gold bearing quartz.

The rich specimens of ore shown by the Beekman bank in Jacksonville, and at the permanent exhibit building at Medford have attracted great crowds during the past few days, and some of the ore will be a leading feature in Jackson county's exhibit at the Lewis and Clark fair. One 33-ounce chunk shows about \$400 in wire gold, and is a very showy specimen. An old-time specimen from the same ledge, weighing fourteen ounces, shows six ounces in gold and a trifle of silver.

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Widow Stood Them Off.

Down at Olathie, Kas., a tree has become an "issue." The mayor ordered that trees along a certain walk be cut down. Mrs. Jennie Baker protested against the cutting of one in front of her place. It is a maple over 50 years old, and is 90 feet high. Under its protecting limbs the Delaware and Wyandotte Indians made a treaty. Mrs. Baker and her daughter walked around the tree all day yesterday. The wood choppers couldn't use the axe, for either the widow or her daughter were in the way. The neighbors applauded, and brought the widow and her daughter their meals, and jeered at the wood choppers until they quit. A temporary injunction has been secured by the widow.

Didn't Pay to Use Stamps.

The retail merchants of St. Joe, Mo., reached a sudden decision that thereafter they would give no premium stamps. The decision threw the women who had been saving them into a panic, and they descended in a mob on the premium stamp store with their savings, with the result that in a few hours 1,200,000 stamps were taken in, representing \$120,000 worth of merchandise sold. Some of the women who had been saving for a certain kind of knife, a lamp with a yellow bowl, or a certain kind of tumbler, found some one ahead of them when they got there, and were so indignant the police had to be called to protect the manager. St. Joe merchants decided it didn't pay to use stamps.
