

KAISER URGING FOR PEACE

He Writes to the Czar to Give Up the Present Struggle

St. Petersburg, June 1.—Advices from Berlin say the Kaiser yesterday forwarded an urgent dispatch to the czar, urging him to make peace. The message was followed by a long autograph letter, pointing out the reasons why Russia should give up the present struggle.

Was Killed.
Washington, June 1.—Minister Grieson reports it as officially announced that Admiral Volkorsam was killed and not captured, as reported on the 30th.

Tried to Fool Them.
Tokio, June 1.—An officer of the Russian battleship Borodino, now a prisoner at Maizura, says that, while Admiral Sjevstevsky raised his flag on the mainmast, he was really on board the Borodino during the action. When the Borodino sank the Admiral boarded the destroyer Bedovi, on which he was eventually captured.

Cabled Thanks.
New York, June 1.—Marquis Italo de Banker Henry Clews: Thanks for telegram of congratulations. Enemy's damage actually greater than hitherto officially published."

Great Rejoicing.
Kobe, June 1.—The captured Russian battleship Orel arrived at Maizura, flying the Japanese flag. There will be great rejoicing here tonight in honor of the Japanese victory. The town is illuminated.

Wants a Guarantee.
Washington, June 1.—It is stated by diplomatic authority that before peace is concluded Japan will demand from the powers a guarantee that Russia will fulfill all the conditions imposed.

Togo's Report.
London, June 1.—Baron Hayashi has received Admiral Togo's seventh report of the battle, which places the total losses at 800. Torpedo boats numbered 34, 25 and 69, which were sunk, are the only vessels lost by Japan. The admiral says: "The Orel was seriously damaged early in the battle on

STARTLING TESTIMONY

Labor President's Testimony Before Jury Creates Alarm In Business Circles

Chicago, June 1.—Levy Mayer, attorney for the employers, told the grand jury this morning that a state of anarchy exists in Chicago, owing to the strike, and that the law was openly violated, and requested indictments against the union leaders and strikers. Albert Young, president of the local teamsters' union, told the jury that himself and two companions were offered \$10,000 two years ago by certain prominent business men if they would call a strike against rival firms. He announced that he was prepared to give the jury full details. This testimony, following similar testimony on the part of President Shea, created consternation in business circles. The teamsters' joint council voted to have a peace committee meet the managers of the department stores in an effort to effect a settlement.

FOUR LIVES ARE LOST

Pendleton, Or., June 1.—Telephone messages from Heppner state that as a result of a cloudburst Wednesday on Rhea creek, seven miles above Heppner, Mrs. J. R. Nunemaker and child and two children of A. P. Cox were drowned in the rushing waters.

The cloudburst caused no serious damage to Heppner, whose people are giving aid to the stricken district. Considerable livestock is reported to have perished, though the carrying away of telephone wires renders complete reports unavailable. Rhea creek runs parallel to Willow creek, which runs through Heppner.

Tokio, June 1.—Later reports place the Russian losses at 7000 to 9000, exclusive of the 4000 captured. It is feared a majority perished, as calculating the complements of the sunken and captured ships at upward of 10,000, this leaves an even thousand unaccounted for. Many bodies have been washed ashore in the vicinity of the battle.

Time to Think It Over.
Washington, June 1.—Minister Takahira had a brief talk with the President today, and on leaving said: "All this peace talk is mere gossip. It is too early yet to talk peace. Russia must have time to think it over. When she has done so there may be some ground for peace, but there is none now."

Business on Paid Benefits.
President Young is said to have told the jury the bribe offer was offered by the jury that the bribe was offered by a firm prominently connected with the present strike if he would call out the teamsters of Sears, Roebuck & Co. He also said that big bribes had been offered teamsters on several occasions, but all refused. In one instance business men paid the union \$30,000 in strike benefits.

Miners Still Buried.
Montrose, Colo., June 1.—The body of Herman O. Kerman, of Denver, was recovered in the Gunnison tunnel this morning, making six dead. Benjamin Taylor and Fred Green are still buried, but are alive, though the latter is being slowly crushed to death. A rubber tube was forced to the entombed men this morning, and they are being supplied with milk.

Chief Assassinated.
Vienna, June 1.—A dispatch from Czenstochau, Poland, says Chief of Police Rosaki was assassinated this morning. The assailant escaped.

Calls for Statement.
Washington, June 1.—The Comptroller of the Currency made a call on the national banks for a statement of the condition at the close of business Monday, May 29.

One Not Heard From.
Lizard Light, June 1.—The Thistle crossed the line at 12:44 this afternoon. The Apache alone is unsighted.

PAID OUT TOO MUCH

Frick Report Scores Hyde and Alexander for Negligence and Laxity

New York, June 1.—The contents of the Frick report on the Equitable Life Assurance Co. is leaking out. The most radical declaration insists that all who profited as members, "James H. Hyde and his associates" in the syndicates must make restitution. The report practically demands the removal of President Alexander, Hyde and Tarbell. It declares they made waste, and that extravagance exists in practically every department of the society. That Alexander's office was managed with laxity and negligence, and censures the system prevailing in Hyde's office by which clerks were paid enormous salaries, and objects to the big salary paid Hyde and Alexander. Hyde held conferences with his counsel today, with a view to protecting his interests.

MURDER AT EUGENE

Eugene, Or., June 1.—Stanford Skinner, a prominent farmer and wife, residing northeast of Eugene, were shot and killed this morning by John Richards, a brother of Mrs. Skinner. Richards left Skinner's residence angry, and returned early this morning with a Winchester, and, without warning, began shooting. The daughter saved herself by flight. Richards has surrendered.

President's Southern Trip.
Washington, June 1.—It is officially announced that the President's southern trip will begin October 17th, and occupy 12 days. The extra session of congress, therefore, will not be called October 16th, as expected.

Panama, June 1.—Governor Magoon has appointed ex-Governor Duran as chief justice of the supreme court for the canal zone.

THE LEWIS AND CLARK EXPOSITION

Opened This Afternoon With a Large Crowd in Attendance

Portland, Or., June 1.—The Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition, commemorating the 100th anniversary of the exploration of the Oregon country by an expedition commanded by Captains Meriwether Lewis and William Clark, was opened today. The buildings, of which there are a score of considerable size, are complete in every detail, and most of the exhibits are ready for inspection.

The official hour for the commencement of the exercises was 1 o'clock, at which time the officials of the exposition, state commissioners and distinguished guests assembled on the lake front. Long before this time the grounds were filled with nearly half the population of Portland, and the remainder was apparently thronging to the exposition grounds. To the many thousands of the local population were added many more who came in on excursion trains last night and this morning.

The first demonstration of the day was a big parade about the grounds, in which military, civil and spectacular features were the attractions. Many bands were in the procession, and thousands afoot and on horseback added to the attractiveness of the pageant. Following the parade were the open air exercises held on the shore of Guild's lake.

On the shore of the lake a stand had been erected for the speakers and seats provided for the listeners. Promptly at the time set the assemblage was called to order by President H. W. Goode, of the exposition, who requested the audience to rise while the Right Reverend David H. Moore, Methodist Episcopal bishop of Oregon, delivered the invocation. After the march, "Imperial Oregon," had been played by Innes' band, President Goode, as the

chief executive of the exposition, delivered an address, at the conclusion of which he introduced Vice-President Fairbanks as the chief speaker of the day. The vice-president's address reviewed at length the achievements of the Pacific Northwest country since its first exploration of Lewis and Clark, and spoke of the importance of the exposition to this section, and to the nation at large. Loud applause followed the conclusion of the vice-president's remarks.

Addressees followed by United States Senator Clarence D. Clark, of Wyoming, and Congressman J. A. Towney, of Minnesota. Mayor Williams welcomed the visitors on behalf of the city of Portland, and Governor Chamberlain extended greeting for the state of Oregon.

At the conclusion of the speeches greeting were exchanged between President Roosevelt and President Goode and the exposition was declared to be formally opened. The speaker's stand was electrically connected with the White House and President Roosevelt "pressed the button" that started the wheels in the machinery hall, and thus actually opened the great exposition. The messages exchanged were full of good feeling and interest and showed the most thorough accord of the people of this section with the chief executive.

A marvelous transformation followed the telegraphic signal. Operators here were waiting for the response from the White House, and as quickly as it came they touched the keys which released the fastenings of the thousands of banners on the staffs on the roofs of all the large exhibit palaces. Simultaneously with the unfurling of the flags all the bands burst forth in melody.
