SCHOOL MATTERS AGAIN

Inquiry as to How Resignations Were Procured

Teachers Removed Without Being Given Any Chance to Be Even Voted For

Editor Daily Capital Journal:—As one of the people who are sending children to school I would like to know how the resignation of some of our best trained teachers was brought about. Will you please explain the way it was done in the interest of fair play and common justice.

ANOTHER MOTHER.

The lady should know that all Salem teachers were asked to send in applications to be re-employed and did so about a month ago. The board held a meeting Saturday evening, May 20, and all members were present including City Superintendent Traver. At this meeting the minutes do not show that any action on electing teachers was taken, nor was any one elected. There was a secret meeting of the board, a kind of private caucus at which the different teachers were discussed but not for publication and the public is not supposed to know what took place at that meeting. It is not known whether the city superintendent was present, and it is not supposed that he was present. The board adjourned on Tuesday, May 23, when they met at 7:30 and elected teachers, and the resignations of Misses Bellinger, Smith, Myers, Hazard and Judd were read and accepted. Others were elected in their places, as their friends on the board supposed that they were going to take places elsewhere, and did not know their resignations had been procured. All that can be learned about these resignations is from the teachers themselves, who say that about 10 o'clock Tuesday, the day set for electing teachers, they were served with a written notice from the clerk of the board, James C. Goodale, at their rooms where they were teaching, asking that they submit their resignations by not later than 7:30 that evening, by order of the board. No reason or explanation was offered and all they could do was to send in their written resignations. The action of the board, if there was any action, was taken Saturday night and they were not notified until Tuesday and not having time to make any showing went out by unanimous vote of even those who would have voted to retain them if they had been given a chance to vote on them.

As there is much local interest in this matter, and as it is contrary to all past practices of the school board, here is the official minutes taken from the records of the school board as made by the clerk:

"The resignations of Grace Bellinger, Bessie Smith, Maud Meyers, Edith Hazard, and Caroline Judd were read and on motion accepted."

The above is all that can be learned about the matter. There is no criticism of the persons who were put in the places of these teachers. The criticism that comes to the newspapers is the way the resignations were procured. All the teachers removed are ladies who stand high in the teaching profession, and against most of them there had been little or no complaint. Their scholarship and conduct is not questioned and to many parents it seems unnecessary changes were made in an arbitrary manner and without giving these ladies a fair opportunity. Some of the board laugh and say all they lacked was votes enough to elect them, and other members refuse to discuss the subject. In the meantime it is said a number of other teachers will resign.

For a number of years in the management of Salem schools there have been no removals unless complaints were made by patrons of the schools. It is claimed that the standards established under City Superintendent Traver made these changes necessary, but it does not appear that he filed any objection to these teachers. In the Lincoln school a few of the ladies at one time had trouble with Principal Goodale, but as he has been removed to the North school that could not be assigned as a reason for removing three teachers from that school practically at no one's instance. The whole matter should be investigated and the real cause of the removals assigned on some one's authority. If that is not done, and if arbitrary power can remove anyone at any time there will be few first-class teachers who will want positions in the Salem schools.
