



The lady should know that all Sa lem teachers were asked to send in applications to be re-employed and did so about a month ago. The board held a meeting Saturday evening, May 20, and all members were present in cluding City Superintendent Traver. At this meeting the minutes do not show that any action on electing teachers was taken, nor was any one elected. There was a secret meeting of the board, a kind of private caucus at which the different teachers were discussed but not for publication and the public is not supposed to know what took place at that meeting. It is,

not known whether the city superintendent was present, and it is not supposed that he was present. 
