

PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS ADOPTED

The City Council Acts Upon South Commercial Street Improvement

Salem's city council met last evening in called session for the purpose of considering what is likely to be the most important business ever undertaken by that body—that of paving streets. Mayor Waters called the meeting to order with a quorum present, as follows: Aldermen Downing, Steusloff, Crossan, Goodale, Churchill, Skafie, Acheson and Bayne.

The meeting was opened by the reading of the official call by City Recorder Moores. This was followed by reading the specifications for the South Commercial street improvement, which were adopted.

Upon motion the committee on printing was authorized to prepare an advertisement for bids, to be submitted to the council at its next regular meeting.

A resolution was adopted to declare June 14th a holiday, the same being Salem day at the Lewis and Clark fair.

The specifications provide that the improvement shall be of first-class macadam. The grade of the street is to be left practically as it is, but excavations are to be made in the center or crown to a depth of eight inches, which is to be filled to a rounding level with crushed rock. All of the street work, with the exception of an eight-foot strip in the center, which is to be occupied and improved by the street railway company, will be done by the city, at the expense of the abutting property owners.

The first layer will be of crushed rock, none of which shall be larger than will pass through a four-inch mesh screen, and laid to a depth of five inches. After this is thoroughly packed down and rolled by a roller of not less than 250 pounds weight per lineal inch another three-inch layer of smaller crushed rock, known as screenings and not to be larger than one inch in diameter, will be added and thoroughly rolled, as in the case of the first layer. Until a cement substitute can be provided, the curb of the street must be made of planks, not less than three inches thick and 12 inches wide, secured
