SUES FOR \$25,000

Postal Clerk Sues the Southern Pacific for Injuries Received

Complaint was filed in department No. 1 of the circuit court this morning by S. W. Maupin against the Southern Pacific railroad. Plaintiff alleges that on the 27th day of October, 1904, he was employed as a postal clerk on the train running from Woodburn and Naton, that while he was entering the car, in the usual manner, at Woodburn, defendant's employees suddenly backed said car, catching plaintiff between the car and a truck, and was thereby greatly bruised and wounded, his ribs broken, cartilage torn loose, his arms bruised, his spine and brain injured, and that he became sick and unable to transact business, and is now sick and permanently injured. He asks \$500 as attorney fees and costs, and for \$25,000 damages. E. P. Moreom and H. J. Bigger are attorneys for the plaintiff.
