MOTHERS ENTER PROTEST

Request the Reinstatements of Misses Meyers, Bellinger and Smith

The patrons of the Lincoln school met at the Leslie M. E. church, in South Salem, last evening for the purpose of considering the matter of the enforced resignation of the Misses Maud Myers, Grace Bellinger and Bessie Smith, and to take steps to secure their reinstatement as teachers. Jessie Macey was elected chairman, and E. O. Flynn secretary.

The situation was thoroughly discussed as to the manner of securing the resignations of the ladies, the arbitrary action of the directors, the injustice done them, and the means of securing their reinstatement. The sentiment was unanimous that the teachers were thoroughly competent, and that the board acted unwisely in asking their resignation. It was stated that the ladies had made application for re-election, but the board gave them no choice but to resign, and no reason for the request.

The discussion took a wide range, and was generally participated in.

The following resolutions were adopted:

"Whereas, for several years last past Misses Maud Myers, Grace Bellinger and Bessie Smith have been employed as teachers in the public schools of Salem, and

"Whereas, each of these ladies has displayed great ability, efficiency and competency in the discharge of her duties, and

"Whereas, each of these ladies has resigned her position as teacher in said school, such resignation having been secured in a manner that was unfair to them, individually, and unjust to them professionally, and

"Whereas, it has been learned that there are still vacancies upon the teaching staff of the public schools of this city, and

"Whereas, we believe that it would be impossible to fill these positions more acceptably than has been done in the past by those three ladies,

"Now, therefore, be it resolved by the patrons of Lincoln school, in this meeting assembled, that we request the school directors of this district to re-

instate these ladies to their former positions in the Lincoln school, without prejudice to their good name and standing."

A committee, consisting of John Bayne, J. A. Carson, L. H. McMahon, Lee W. Acheson and Mrs. Sweinink, was appointed to appear before the board of school directors in behalf of the three lady teachers named.

The following resolution was also adopted censuring the directors for refusing the South Salem school patrons the use of the Lincoln school building for the purpose of holding a meeting to discuss school matters.

"Whereas, the patrons of Lincoln school have been unable to procure the use of the school building for the purpose of discussing school matters, and a number of the members of the board refused to give the use of the school building as aforesaid

"Resolved, therefore, that we, the patrons of Lincoln school hereby protest against such refusal and censure the members of the board of directors who refused to allow or consent to the use of the school building for the purpose aforesaid."

Before adjourning a voluntary collection was taken up amounting to \$3.25, which was donated to the church as an appreciation of its use by the meeting.

MONTANA LAND FRAUDS

Helena, Mont., June 6.—The cases against R. M. Cobban and 53 others, indicted on charges of perjury and subornation of perjury in connection with extensive Western Montana land frauds were called today before United States Judge Hunt.

The government alleges that Cobban induced the indicted persons to take up lands, and turn them over to him, and that he, in turn, as an agent, transferred them to Senator W. A. Clark. The government has also sued Senator Clark for the recovery of the lands.

BANKERS DENY THE REPORT

Russian Government Bankers Deny Report That Czar Was Assassinated

Berlin, June 6.—It is reported on the Bourse that the Czar has been assassinated. It is said a private telegram to this effect was received by the Mendelssohn's, bankers of the Russian government.

The Mendelssohn's deny receiving a telegram regarding the assassination of the Czar. The report is not confirmed from other sources.

All Left Port Arthur.

Chefoo, June 6.—General Balaschoff and staff has arrived from Port Arthur. He leaves today for Russia, overland. The embalmed body of General Kenderashenko was brought here by General Balaschoff, to be shipped to Odessa. The last of the Russians have left Port Arthur.

Breach Blocks Removed.

Manila, June 6.—It is learned the ultimatum from Washington to Vice-Admiral Enquist is not so severe as at first reported. The question of time is still under discussion. The breach blocks of the three Russian cruisers have been temporarily removed.

Has Resigned.

Paris, June 6.—It is officially announced that M. Delcasse, minister of foreign affairs, has resigned, and that Premier Rouvier has assumed charge, temporarily.

More Are Interned.

Washington, June 6.—Consul-General Rogers, at Shanghai, cables that seven Russian colliers at Woosung will be interned by order of the Chinese government. The Russian torpedo boat destroyer Bodry is interned at Shanghai.

Hope for Peace.

Paris, June 6.—The Temps, a semi-official organ, this afternoon prints the following from St. Petersburg: "It is learned from an authoritative source that unanimous effort of the ministers are directed toward peace, and they hope to succeed shortly."

Looking for Warships.

Manila, June 6.—The Raleigh, Cincinnati and Baltimore have been sent to the northeastern coast of Luzon to look for Japanese warships.

Known What to Do Now.

Manila, June 6.—The ultimatum from Washington directing Admiral Enquist to either sail at the end of 24 hours or disarm his ships was delivered to the admiral this morning.

At Sir John's Grave.

Kingston, Ont., June 6.—The grave of Sir John A. Macdonald, in Cataract cemetery, was decorated today with wreaths and other floral offerings, this being the fourteenth anniversary of the death of the great conservative leader. Delegations from political and other organizations visited the cemetery and participated in exercises in memory of the illustrious dead.

Jimmy Is Let Out.

Pittsburg, June 6.—James Hazen Hyde has been removed from the directorate of the Mellon National Bank and Union Trust Company. This action follows the declaration by H. C. Frick that he will not again sit on the board with Hyde.

Killed in Collision.

Los Angeles, June 6.—A head-on collision on the Salt Lake road, at Riverside, killed two men, and one was fatally injured.

A special newspaper train from Los Angeles collided with the overland No. 1. Both locomotives were demolished.

WISCONSIN RIVERS ON RAMPAGE

Lo's of Life and Heavy Damage Results From Cyclone and Floods

Milwaukee, June 6.—Floods and storms in Wisconsin last night and today caused the loss of one million of dollars. Twenty streets in Fond du Lac are under water, and the loss is \$150,000.

Chippewa Falls, June 6.—Two boys were swept off a bridge and drowned. The town of Curtis reports a cyclonic storm and \$100,000 damage. Two were killed and ten injured. The Lutheran church and 15 houses were wrecked. Severe losses are reported from Sheboygan, Poynette, Portage and Barron. Many towns are cut off.

Dams went out this noon at Waldo and Bingham, and the entire corn crop of the state is ruined, except in the higher places. The drainage from the flood is growing every hour. The flood has caused a loss of \$50,000 each at Beloit and Sheboygan.

Town Full of Water.

A big dam at Cheboygan Falls was swept away, carrying houses and barns down stream. The water is running over the town three feet deep. All trains are stalled. Several are reported drowned at Newton. The town is isolated, and all trains in the entire state are delayed.

Cloudburst in Michigan.

Detroit, June 6.—Western Michigan was visited by a cloudburst last night, the worst in 40 years. Eighty blocks were inundated at Grand Rapids, and 500 homes surrounded by water. Train service is suspended in the vicinity of Muskegon, where the losses reach 100,000. Great damage is reported from Ionia, where the roads and the railway is washed out. A Porre Marquette train was wrecked at Ionia in a wash-out this morning, and Engineer Alvord and Fireman Paine killed.

Still Working for Peace.

Chicago, June 6.—The executive board of the teamsters' met at the Briggs House this morning, and began a conference, with a view of finding a way to end the strike. It is reported a committee will be appointed to wait on the employers. A peace committee was appointed last night by the teamsters' joint committee to meet the State street merchants today, in an effort to effect individual agreements. Tonight the truck drivers will meet to vote on the question of arbitration. In view of the announcement of Attorney Mayer, the employers will have no dealings with the strike committee unless it is clothed with full power to make agreements with the employers in general. Small hopes are entertained that the present peace moves will succeed.

Is Out of It.

Philadelphia, June 6.—President Cassatt, of the Pennsylvania railroad, today confirmed the report that he had resigned from the Equitable Life directorate.

He Celebrates.

A man closely associated with Hyde says today's report that the Hendrick report would demand the resignation of Hyde was not well founded, and in no event would Hyde resign, nor could he be forced out. Hyde celebrated his 29th birthday today, and received numerous congratulations.

Talked With the King.

London, June 6.—The entire diplomatic corps today paid their respects to King Alfonso at Buckingham Palace. Ambassador Reid had a long conversation with the king, and subsequently the king attended mass in the Roman Catholic cathedral at Westminster.

May Get New Trial.

Boston, June 6.—The supreme court today decided to consider the exceptions to the verdict which found Charles L. Tucker guilty of the murder of Mabel Page. Tucker will probably get a new trial.

Out the Gate.

Portland, June 6.—The Transcontinental Passenger Association is in session, and will cut the one-way rate from Missouri river points to the fair.

Tornado in New York.

Birmingham, N. Y., June 6.—A tornado last night wrecked four houses and damaged 100 more. Much damage resulted in adjacent counties.

LANE IS ELECTED MAYOR

Democratic Candidate Elected Mayor of Portland by 1000 Plurality

Portland, June 6.—In the municipal election held here yesterday Dr. Harry Lane, Democratic candidate for mayor, defeated George H. Williams, the present mayor, by about 1300 plurality. Five Republican councilmen at large were elected. The vote was lighter than it was expected to be, not more than 14,300 votes being cast, which was 58 per cent of the registered vote. FUTURE EMPEROR WEDDED

The Wedding Celebrated Today With Severe Though Rich Simplicity

Berlin, June 6.—The wedding of Crown Prince Frederick William, who if he lives will one day be German Emperor and King of Prussia, and the Duchess Cecile of Mecklenburg-Schwerin took place today in the chapel of the Schloss with severe though rich simplicity.

The spectacular part of the wedding, consisting of the arrival of the bridal party at the chapel, was witnessed by one of the largest assemblage of people that ever crowded into the streets of the capital. Along the route the bride-to-be was greeted with a continuous outburst of cheering.

The spirit of the affair was plain and democratic, although the costly gowns and jewels and the showy uniforms of distinguished personages, high officials of the empire, the army and the navy, the representatives of the people in the Reichstag and the municipalities furnished a regal setting.

The first ceremonies of the day were private, and the attendance was limited to the households of the bride and bridegroom. The laws and customs of Germany, like those of most continental countries, require both a civil and a religious marriage. The civil ceremony took place this forenoon in the palace. The simple legal forms were quickly and quietly gone through. These comprised merely the reading of the marriage law and the signing of the contract.

The religious ceremony was magnificent. Though the attendance was limited to three hundred it made up a gorgeous mass of many colored uniforms and beautiful gowns with flashing jewels and glittering orders of the royal personages and nobility.
