Street Paving.

Editor Journal:—The element of economy enters into street paving. The cost of paving is, approximately speaking, very little more than the laying of cement walks, yet, the non-progressive policy has never paved a street nor done anything of a permanent nature for the public streets of Salem. A reasonable estimate places the total expenditure for street work on Commercial, State and Court streets—covering the past 30 years—at \$150,000. Divide this \$150,000 into yearly expenditures, and it means about \$5000 a year for 30 years on her streets, and today the streets are not paved. Once more divide this yearly expenditure of \$5000 among the property owners and we find that over seventy-five principal owners have been paying about \$65 a year each. All owners have been paying approximately this assessment in the way of city taxes for every year they have owned property, dating ownership and possession any time back for 30 years. The pioneer property owners have been paying many years this heavy expense. The newcomers are also paying it, and will be compelled to pay it for years to come—unless a progressive spirit showers its infinite blessings over the administrative powers of our fair city.

If our street work of the past had been what it should have been, or, in other words, of any account, the expenditure should have diminished every year. The portions improved would not need further improvement, and after a lapse of 30 years the streets of the whole city could have been properly paved for the same expenditure which has left the streets in their present condition. All this is due to the policy of saving a present penny and paying out a future dollar. That streets treated to improvement for 30 years should still require the same amount of expense for yearly maintenance, shows without argument that some poor judgment has been exercised and the principle of true economy buried by factors whose eyesight dimmed after reaching the end of their nose.

If the people of Salem today were asked to spend \$150,000 for any kind of street improvement and for the outlay got our present condition of streets, the howl would be as justifiable as it would be loud, and the kick a righteous one of indignation. An amount like \$150,000 spent on any kind of legitimate pavement would have given us better streets than we now have. Where is the economy of going on, year after year, wasting our good money in so-called improvement, which is no improvement at all, and 30 years' experience tells us so? Had the improvements been truly economical, the taxation for this department of our city government would have gradually decreased every year. The policy is exactly like the foolish man who contracted to dig a ditch and as fast as he threw out the dirt, he employed others to throw it in. So, for 30 years, we have hired men to haul on gravel in the summer and haul off mud in the winter. These very streets we daily gaze on with tears in our eyes are streets which have had \$150,000 spent on them. What do you think of that? Wouldn't it make your heart ache to think of so much economical foolishness? And, further, if you dare spring a movement to pave, then "listen to the hand" who still want the old style management of patch, repair, haul on and then haul off.

Some of the anonymous communicants to our papers have been pretty free with their mud slinging—the mud being easy to scoop up on our principal streets and free after dark—and some of them have been taking snapshot judgment at the city council and its commendable efforts to benefit the city in every way possible. Without fear of contradiction it can be safely said that with every move yet made by the present administration towards public work, there have arisen these angels of spleen and venom to spit upon the effort and cast slurs upon the good intentions of our city council. The writer, for one, is tired of the palpable and illy concealed jealousy, or, if not that, the spirit of wanting to hinder everything the council tried to do, through means and ways not altogether honorable. It might be well for these disturbers to stop long enough to make a comparison of policies. Let them inquire whether it is really a better business policy to haul on and off for 30 years more, or to permanently improve a few streets at a time and get the whole job finally done. Do they still want the same senseless, idiotic policy pursued when we talk of bridges? Do they still want to patch away our money or get something for it? One human life constantly exposed under
