ANOTHER HOUSING MEETING.

Number of Visiting Pastors Assisted at Last Night's Services.

"Personal Magnetism" was the theme of Dr. Martin's splendid discourse at the Christian pavilion last night, and it was listened to attentively by a large number of people. A number of visiting pastors were present and assisted in the services. Among the number were Rev. J. S. McCallum, of Eugene; Rev. A. J. Adams, of Waiteburg, Wash., who has been here for a week; Rev. and Mrs. T. S. Handmaker, state temperance evangelists; Rev. Clark Bower, of Albany, and Rev. J. J. Evans, state evangelist.

The pastor, in making his announcements last night, said many were inquiring when the meeting would close, and that it was not known, even by the evangelists, when it would close. The services will, in all probability, however, last during the remainder of this week and next week. The evangelists are in better spirits than ever, and will stay as long as it seems desirable, or until the state convention at Turner. After the convention Dr. Martin and Prof. McVay will go to Silverton, where they will hold a service for the Christian church, of which Rev. R. L. Cartwright is pastor.

The subject of the sermon for tonight will be "Infant Baptism Examined." Professor McVay will sing as usual.

Turner Case Settled.

The case of Owens against Turner was finally decided yesterday. The case is one that has awakened considerable interest, and is of a peculiar nature, being brought by J. H. Wilson, as the one friend of the plaintiff, who is of weak mind. The complaint alleges that Turner took advantage of the weakness of Owens' intellect to persuade him to trade property situate in Marion county for property in Lane county. Owens had not seen the property, and relied upon the statements of defendant, and ultimately made a deed to the Marion county property to Turner. Suit was brought to set aside this deed, and the plaintiff's contentions were sustained in Judge Galloway's decision. The decree orders that said deeds be declared void, that Turner repay the value of the personal property, about \$153, and to pay the costs.
