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UNITE THE VALLEY.

The second convention of the Willamette Valley Development League will be held in Independence June 12-13.

The convention at Salem in March set the ball rolling for the recognition of the interests of Western Oregon as a distinct entity.

Western Oregon cannot depend on Portland influences for normal development. Western Oregon must fight its own battles.

The opening of the locks at Oregon City, by making them free government locks, and the construction of railroads from the illamette valley to the Coast and to the interior of the state are matters of vital importance.

The convention at Independence can be counted upon to strike some telling blows in these directions. The population, products, and wealth of this region have long enough lain dormant.

The labors of the convention at Independence are important and should enlist a large attendance of the wide-awake business men and women of Western Oregon.

ABRAHAM LINCOLN CENTRE.

The Journal is remembered with a copy of the program of the dedicatory services over the opening of the Abraham Lincoln Centre, a new building devoted to social settlement work in Chicago.

The tenth meeting of the Congress of Religion was held in this building from April 23 to June 1, and is the outgrowth of the work of All Soul's church of Chicago.

William Kent, a Chicago capitalist, has taken a leading part in the organization and construction of this beautiful building, dedicated to the solution of sociological problems.

The building was dedicated with impressive ceremony to public service, and in honor of the memory of Abraham Lincoln, Democrat of democrats.

It is located at the corner of Oakwood boulevard and Langley avenue.

LET US HAVE A FREE COUNTRY.

Some Oregon newspapers are roasting Rev. Selleck, of the Salem First M. E. Church, for taking a position against appropriations for sectarian institutions.

Rev. Selleck took his position during the legislature and was then subjected to criticism for taking the position he did. But the newspapers can easily go too far in this.

We must not forget that we have a free country and under free institutions the citizen, in any profession or out of it, has the same right to his views as the newspaper.

Rev. Selleck takes a view that under the constitution of Oregon such appropriations are forbidden, and honestly taking this view has a right to enter his protest if he sees fit.

Others may not agree with him. This paper may not agree with him. But it is a difference of mere human opinion. The principle underlying the whole matter is the right of expression.

In claiming his right under the constitution to free speech Rev. Selleck has committed no such offense as the newspapers would make out against him. In a free country even ministers have rights.

A Political Pull.

The sheriff of Wasco county this morning delivered to the superintendent of the penitentiary two victims, both convicted of the crime of larceny from the person. One of them is H. I. Galvin, who had the honor of being arrested by Oregon's governor at Celilo, upon the occasion of the opening of the state portage railroad from that point to The Dalles. The other is William Johnson. As they were both convicted of the same crime, tried in the same court, and sentenced by the same judge, the benefits of having "a political pull" are aptly illustrated, for Galvin got three and a half years, while Johnson had to be satisfied with two.

Lehman's Factory Turning Out All Kinds of Work.

The sash and door factory of U. J. Lehman is running to its full capacity, and its product, which nearly all finds a local market, gives an indication of the amount of building going on in Salem and vicinity. Among the products of the plant recently shipped was 35 combination wagon racks, of the Mitchell, Lewis & Staver pattern. Most of them went to Eastern Oregon and Washington, and were only a sample. Mr. Lehman is of the opinion that this will become quite a feature in his business, as there is a big demand for them. When the scribe visited the plant yesterday a beautiful walnut table was being finished for Dr. Richardson. It was made entirely of black walnut, grown on his father's place near Seio. Then there were all kinds of "ginger bread" stuff, ornaments, cornices, etc., piled around, besides the regular run on sash, doors and like products.
