BOARD IS APPOINTED

Tax Commission Board Appointed Yesterday—Race for Secretary

The board of tax commissioners, which was to have been appointed Tuesday, was named late yesterday afternoon. The commission is formed under a law passed by the last legislature, and is appointed by the governor, secretary of state and state treasurer. The board was appointed as follows:

E. B. Seabrook (Dem.), of Marshfield, by Governor Chamberlain; Fred W. Mulkey (Rep.), of Portland, by State Treasurer Moore, and W. J. Lachner (Rep.), of Baker City, by Secretary of State Dunbar.

The commission will meet in the office of secretary of state at 10 o'clock on next Monday morning to organize by the election of a president, and the first important duty which they will be to elect a secretary.

There are many candidates for the secretaryship of this commission, for while there is going to be plenty of work in connection with the job, there is a salary for the labor in the shape of about \$200 a month salary. Among those aspiring for the place is our fellow townsman, Frank Davey, who seems to have the best chance of securing the place. The board is composed, by law, to meet on the second Monday in June, at noon, elect a chairman and take the oath of office. It will elect a secretary and begin its labors.

The act provides that the commission shall consist of three members, to be selected from different parts of the state, and not more than two of whom shall be of the same political party, to constitute a board of commissioners for the purpose of examining and reporting upon the matters of assessment and taxation of property in the state, the collection of revenues in taxes, and the framing of laws upon that subject, to be submitted to the legislative assembly at its next regular session, and an appropriation of \$7000 was made to cover the expense.

In conducting the investigation the board has the power to require all officers whose duties pertain to the assessment and collection of taxes, as well as to call upon individuals, partnerships, corporations, their officers, managers, agents, attorneys in fact, for the purpose of securing all information possible upon the subject, and the failure of any one to so appear when called upon or to answer all questions promptly and truthfully is subject to punishment under the laws already provided for such offenses. It is left to the discretion of the board as to whether with-

nesses called before it be allowed compensation for attendance or traveling. When its labors are completed and the report made, 5000 copies of them are required to be printed for distribution, one copy of which must be given to each member of the present legislature, one copy to each newspaper in the state, several copies sent out to each county for general distribution, and a sufficient number retained to supply the needs of the next legislature. In addition to this, the governor is required to cause to be printed a copy of the report of the board, to be submitted to the next session of the legislature.

CORDS AND CORDS
Of Wood Brought in for Electric Light and Water Plants.
The amount of cord wood being brought into the city just now is astonishing. It looks as though all the farmers had suddenly gone into the wood business, and each was trying to win the medal for the greatest quantity. At first one can but wonder where it all goes to, and to satisfy an idle curiosity and also to chase the elusive item, The Journal man investigated. While there seems to be a general laying in of wood for next winter, even at this early season, which accounts for some of the activity, there is a regular procession of teams with two objective points, the electric plant and the water plant. There are acres of it at each place—wood of all kinds and degrees, slab wood, edgings, fir anything that will burn, and besides this the sawdust from the mill. It looks now as though there was wood on hand enough to last indefinitely, but the steady drain eats up big ricks at a surprising rate.
