INDEPENDENCE DEVELOPMENT CONVENTION

Fine Program for Two Days Gathering in Interest of Valley

Delegations from all over the valley will gather at Independence Monday and Tuesday of next week at the second Willamette Development Convention.

The convention opens Monday afternoon, and will be addressed by some of the ablest and most enthusiastic workers for the development of Western Oregon.

The bankers of Western Oregon will form an association at 3 o'clock as a feature of the development work. There will also be a good roads section, with addresses by Governor Chamberlain, County Judge Ryan, of Clackamas

county and Secretary Richardson, (not Tom Richardson) of the National Good Roads Association.

A number of the Salem automobilists have consented to run their cars over, and some will carry delegates. The Commercial Club, of this city, requests that owners of automobiles in this city make an effort to go to Independence Monday and Tuesday, and help out the development of Oregon and aid in boosting for good roads.

It is expected that the Oregon Suburban Car Co. will have one of its 12-seat automobiles running between Salem and Independence Monday.

Automobile Line.

A big automobile arrived in the city last evening, and it will be put on the run between Salem and Independence. It made its first run today, leaving at 1 o'clock, in charge of Mr. Davies, and made the run of 12 miles in about an hour. It will make regular trips hereafter, three a day, but at present the schedule has not been arranged. Monday and Tuesday it will run to suit the convenience of those attending the Willamette Valley Development League meeting, which will be held in Inde-

pendence on those days. It will be here Sundays and evenings, and will no doubt be used by parties on pleasure bent.

It might be added that every point is clamoring for cars, and Eugene offers to guarantee 500 from there any day next week, in order to get a special train. As Salem has determined to attend the fair she should not be backward about coming forward, but get there at once.
