A PLOT TO KILL THE CZAR

Two Young Russian Ladies Commit Suicide When Their Plans are Discovered

The arrest of Miss Leontieff, the daughter of General Leontieff, formerly governor-general of Kharkoff, at St. Petersburg, followed by the suicide of two other young women of high society in Russia, the Princess Tenicheff and Miss Trepoff, niece of the governor-general of St. Petersburg, ought to convince the czar more effectively than any other recent events in Russia, that his methods of governing Russia are driving his subjects to desperation.

These young women, all members of good families, all brought up amid wealth and luxury and all in possession of the advantages of a western European education, concocted a plot to assassinate the emperor of Russia.

Miss Leontieff, at the time of her arrest, was within a few days of her 25th birthday. She had been converted to nihilism by students while attending the University of Zurich, in Switzerland. Her enthusiasm carried her so far that she attached herself to the terrorist section of the revolutionary party, which believes in "propaganda of deed."

Not content with her activity in this direction, Miss Leontieff began quietly to propagate advanced politi-

cal views in her own circle of society. It is not known how many converts to nihilism she made, but it is certain that she succeeded in infecting two of her more intimate friends with her own political beliefs.

These two friends were Princess Tenicheff and Miss Trepoff. The princess was 23 years of age and a member of one of the oldest and most prominent families of the Russian aristocracy. Her father, Prince Tenicheff, is one of the greatest land owning magnates in Russia. His daughter, who was a girl of unusual intelligence and striking beauty, was the recognized heiress of a fortune of \$10,000,000 and to estates covering fully 50,000 acres. Princess Tenicheff, nevertheless, became as keen a nihilist as Miss Leontieff.

Miss Trepoff was the niece of the ultra reactionary governor-general of St. Petersburg, General Trepoff. Her father is a high official in the Russian ministry of war. She associated in the highest circles of Russian society.

The trio discussed schemes for the regeneration of their country. Miss Leontieff suggested that it would be a magnificent achievement if three young women of noble families were to liberate Russia by assassinating the czar. She urged that the czar was really the cause of Russia's present troubles. Some of his relatives, the majority of his ministers and many other reliable advisers had begged him to introduce political reform but the czar obstinately refused to take any steps in this direction and clung persistently to his

absolute power. Miss Leontieff urged that if he could be removed by violence his successor would never dare to oppose popular demands with the same obstinacy.

With characteristic energy, Miss Leontieff declared that she herself would make the first attempt. She proposed that if she failed, one of the other two should make the second attempt. Lots were drawn to decide whether Princess Tenicheff or Miss Trepoff should make the second attempt. The lot fell on Miss Trepoff, so it was decided that if the first attempt made by Miss Leontieff failed, another attempt would be made by Miss Trepoff, and if this also was unsuccessful, a third and final attempt would be made by Princess Tenicheff. The three young women bound themselves by a solemn oath to carry out their murderous plan relentlessly and efficiently.

The czar's doom was apparently a matter of a few days. It was averted by his withdrawal to his palace at Tsarkoe-Selo towards the end of January and the suspension of all court festivities during the present political crisis. The trio of terrorists were confident, however, that they would come face to face with him in the course of the spring or early in the autumn.

Probably with the natural weakness of the sex, one or the other of the three conspirators dropped a hint of their intentions to some bosom friend. Anyhow, Miss Leontieff was suddenly arrested in her own home on a charge of treasonable conspiracy against the life of the emperor of Russia. Explosives and three small hand bombs were found carefully concealed in her bedroom. Her father, who had grown gray in the service of Russia, was dragged off to prison on the suspicion of having supported, or at least tolerated, his daughter's revolutionary activity. Ruin has also overtaken her two brothers, one of whom is a colonel and the other a major in a crack regiment of guards stationed at Tsarkoe-Selo.

The news of Miss Leontieff's arrest caused an unbounded sensation among her exalted friends. Princess Tenicheff and Miss Trepoff were panic stricken. They jumped to the erroneous conclusion that they would be compromised by her seizure. They quickly met and decided to evade all further difficulties by committing suicide. Miss Trepoff left her father's house under the pre-

tense of going for a walk, proceeded in a droschky to a point outside the capital, and threw herself in front of the incoming express from Moscow. She was killed on the spot and her remains were fearfully mangled.

Almost at the same time the Princess Tenicheff blew her brains out with a revolver in the garden surrounding her father's residence in St. Petersburg. The incriminating letters and documents which gave the police all the information now in their possession were found among Princess Tenicheff's belongings.

The discovery of these documents will seal Miss Leontieff's fate. They leave no doubt whatever that she conspired in grim earnest to assassinate the czar. The explosives in her possession supply the remaining evidence to convict her of this serious crime. Inevitably she will be hanged.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE PIONEERS

Sheridan Entertains Founders of Yamhill's Greatness--Senator Booth's Address

The annual meeting of the Yamhill County Pioneers' Association met at Sheridan June 7. The morning was cloudy and threatened rain, but about noon the clouds broke away and the afternoon was an ideal one for an outdoor entertainment. The attendance was quite large.

The meeting was held in the city park, a beautiful oak grove on the outskirts of the town. James Olds, president of the association, presided at the meeting. The Sheridan band furnished music for the association, and won high praise for the excellence of their performance.

The invocation by Rev. T. L. Jones of Amity, was followed by an address of welcome by Mayor Simpson. This was responded to by Captain O. C. Applegate, who chanced to be passing through Sheridan en route to the Grand Ronde Indian reservation. The annual address by Senator Booth of Lane county, was an able presentation of the salient features of Oregon's early history, an estimate of the historical value of the pioneer work, and a touching tribute to his father and mother as representatives of the pioneer men and women.

Mrs. M. L. Bardon, as the representative of the Native Daughters of Oregon, delivered an excellent address. In the absence of Hon. Lee Laughlin, G. O. Holman told "what we owe to the pioneers." B. B. Branson gave a short talk on the early history of Yamhill county.

Vocal music was a feature of the occasion, and was thoroughly enjoyed by all present. The Sheridan double quartet rendered two selections. Lute Brown delighted the audience with a solo, "My Old Oregon Home." Mrs. S. N. Graves recited "The Rescue of the Captives."

The banquet prepared for the pioneers

was arranged on tables in the grove, and was in itself a tribute to the culinary skill, the taste and the hospitality of the ladies of Sheridan and vicinity.

At the business meeting which followed the program, the following officers were elected. President, James Olds; vice president, Mrs. N. J. Membrée; treasurer, Lee Laughlin; secretary, Martha L. Bardon; trustees, Levi Davis, B. B. Branson, and William Merchant.
