GROCERY IN DEPOT

Patrons of the Lake Shore and Michigan Southern and the Rock Island railroads in Chicago, which roads jointly occupy the new La Belle street passenger station, are enjoying an innovation, the like of which is not to be found anywhere else in the country, but which is destined to become popular, with the probability that it will be established in all the large cities.

The innovation is strictly up-to-date grocery store in the passenger station where patrons of the roads may leave a list of their wants on coming to the city in the morning and pick up the parcels on boarding the train for home in the evening. There is a numbering system in connection and if it is desired the parcel will be sent out to the home of the buyer by special messenger. The store is called the La Belle street station store, and is just below the elevated station and connected with it by a bridge. Table delicacies are made a specialty of by the new enterprise. All sorts of bottled goods are on sale, and a soda fountain has been put in to quench the summer thirst of the public.

CLIMATE AND CROP REPORT

The U. S. department of agriculture sends out the following bulletin of the climate and crop conditions for the Willamette Valley and Southern Oregon for the week ending Monday, June 12th:

General Summary.

The first of the week was cloudy and cool and good rains fell in nearly all sections of the state. On Wednesday the rains ceased and the remainder of the week was warm and pleasant.

The warm weather and bright sunshine immediately following the rains had a very beneficial effect on all crops, and a marked improvement is noted, especially in the condition of field corn, potatoes and onions, which are now growing rapidly. Fall grain continues to head nicely, and barley and rye will soon be ready to cut. Spring wheat and oats are growing satisfactorily. The grain aphid continues numerous in the Willamette Valley and in some portions of Southern Oregon, but so far little damage has occurred.

Cherries are ripening slowly, with the yields considerably below average in most sections. Other tree fruits indicate lighter yields than usual, especially peaches, plums and early apples. Late apples and pears promise better results. Bush fruit is setting nicely and an abundant yield is promised.

Willamette Valley.

Wilson.—Cloudy weather has given place to sunshine and all vegetation is making good growth; oats will be very short; stock in good condition; green aphid numerous.

Woodburn (Elliott Prairie), Clackamas county, Geo. Pope.—Warmer weather has had beneficial effect on all crops; hops have improved considerably in certain locations, but many yards will not yield one-fourth of an average crop; vermin is also on the increase; fall wheat and oats appear to be killing well; barley and rye beginning to turn; clover will yield only half crop, and second or seed crop may be counted on being decidedly short; it appears that the clover roots died owing to last year's dry spell; the same holds good as to hops, and it was found this year that the hop stools had made very few new roots; pasturage good and stock in fine condition; gardens making rapid growth; all varieties of fruit will be short in this section.

North Yamhill, Yamhill county, J. T. Patterson.—First of week cool and cloudy, with light showers, latter half clear and warm; crops doing fairly well; aphid and fly have caused little damage so far; hops poor, from half to two-thirds of a crop; few early apples; cherries half a crop; plums fair; pastures good; stock doing well.

Aurora, Marion county, C. D. F. Wilson.—Weather has turned hot and everything is making a good growth; hops, grain, fruit, and potatoes look well; early hay will be ready to cut soon; the hay crop promises well; late potatoes about all planted.

Honkins, Benton county, Perry Eddy.—Weather warmer; gardens have made good growth; grain heading; strawberries ripe, but very poor crop; fruit doing well where the caterpillars have been destroyed.

Albany, Linn county, A. Y. Smith.—Fair and warmer weather; gardens growing nicely, especially potatoes; corn is changing color, and if the warm weather continues it will grow rapidly; spring grain looks well and is growing nicely, but the aphid is working on it in some localities; fall grain in head, but some pieces of wheat will be very light on account of the Hessian fly; the hay crop will be about average; vetch will make a large crop; cheat will be light.

Monmouth, Polk county, J. H. Moran.—The weather is changeable; corn growing very slowly; all other crops doing fairly well.

Southern Oregon.

Olalla, Douglas county, W. R. Wells.—First of the week cloudy and cool, Friday and Saturday warmer; all vegetation doing finely; wheat and other grain crops will be good; hay crop above average.

Dryden, Josephine county, H. S. Martin.—Weather cloudy and cool; gardens growing slowly; strawberries of good quality, but ripening slowly; haying will begin next week; pastures drying up; stock doing well.

Prospect, Jackson county, S. S.

Atkin.—The showers and warm weather have been very favorable for all crops; it is now certain that more than an average crop of hay will be harvested; gardens look fine.
